

NEW POWER HOUSE

With a Capacity of 10,000 to be Built by
the Webster Oil Company.

The Webster Oil Co. is making ex-
cavations for a new power house
which will be constructed in several
week's time. Hitherto the company
has been forced to depend upon a
"dinky" placed near the river bank
for the water supply of the whole
plant. The new power station will
be fitted up with two pumps which
have a daily capacity of 10,000 barrels.
The pumps are to be built by the Ma-
rietta Manufacturing Company and
will be the best of the kind manufac-
tured.

MADAME HERRMANN TO-NIGHT.

Mme. Adalide Herrmann, widow of
the Great Herrmann, who in her royal
opinion has never been equaled as a
magician, and will be the headliner of
the Burke & Chase High Class Vaude-
ville Company at the Auditorium, to-
night. Her entrance into the field of
magic, pure and simple, is not an old
story. Two years ago she was travel-
ing with the Herrmann the Great Co.,
on the central circuit with William E.
Robinson as an assistant. At Joliet,
Ills., in August, 1898 it was suggested
that she should do a turn of magic for
a novelty. She took up the sugges-
tion and has drifted naturally into
vaudeville.

Night in Japan,' and is done without
my uttering a word. My company
consists of five persons—my niece,
Miss Adele Dewey, Hudson Everett,
better known as "Boomsy," and two
mechanics. I carry my own scenery."

"Boomsy" will be remembered by
many theatre-goers as the small black
boy who assisted Herrmann in many
of his tricks. He is a grown man now
and is invaluable to Mme. Herrmann,
through his intimate knowledge of her
late husband's methods. During her
act, Mme. Herrmann wears a Japanese
dress, of her own design, as indeed all
her costumes are. An air of Orient-
ality and mysticism surrounds the
time during which she shows her
skill, and she has proved a worthy
successor of her wonderfully clever
husband. One of her star feats is to
manipulate four billiard balls in one
outstretched hand, causing them to
appear and disappear, one at a time.
This is justly considered a very diffi-
cult feat on account of the large size
