A BIG PLANT

Ohio Valley Wagon Co's Factory at Norwood.

Very few people in the city are aware of the immense amount of improvement now going on at Norwood. Outside of the building of many residences, there are two big institutions about to be opened there of whose magnitude the general public has little knowledge.

The Electric Railway power plant and car barns are soon to be completed giving that company greatly increased facilities for carrying people and lighting the business houses and residences of the city. More space in the Leader will be given to this institution when the work is completed and the machinery is ready to run.

The Ohio Valley Wagon Co. has moved its Fourth street shops to the new buildings in Norwood and a part of the plant is now in operation. Considerable new machinery has been received of late and more is expected. When the machines are all running they will furnish employment to over one hundred men.

The Wagon Company have three large buildings. In the first, a large three-story structure, will be located the machines for doing all kinds of wood piece work necessary for the building of vehicles. From the raw state the material passes from machine to machine until it comes forth in its finished state. The iron work is supplied from the forges located in another part of the works. Every modern appliance for making first class vehicles has been ordered and when it is received this plant will be one of the largest manufacturing institutions in the city.

When the machines are all in and ready to run the management will throw open the factory to the public for a day or two and all who visit and inspect the new plant will be astonished at the progress made.
