REVISED LIST

Shows Thirty-Four Missing as a Result of Explosion.

New York, Oct. 30.—All efforts of the authorities are now directed to cleaning away of the debris of the Tarrant and other buildings wrecked by the explosion yesterday, in a desire to find out how many bodies are buried in them, and as to what was the cause of the explosion.

The efforts of the searchers for the dead were rewarded this evening by the finding of the remains of C. A. Schmidt, and the discovery of what looks to be the bodies of three other persons.

At 10 o'clock tonight, the firemen, while working in the mass of ruins, brought to light a portion of a woman's foot and the top of a crushed skull. The skull had long brown hair attached and is supposed that of a woman. A revised list made up to 10 p. m. shows 34 persons still missing.
