### BOER BOYS

Are Being Surrounded by the Soldiers of the British Army.

Bloemfontein, Oct. 30.—Telegraph lines are still interrupted and mails delayed, owing to the Boers derailing trains ten miles south of Condenburg. All Boers over 14 years of age living outside of a radius of ten miles from Bloemfontein, are being surrounded by the British troops to prevent their rejoining their commands.

### TOWN DESTROYED

By Earthquake and Twenty-Five Lives Were Lost.

Caracas, Venezuela, Oct. 30.—Yesterday's earthquake destroyed the town of Guarenas, resulting in the loss of twenty-five lives. Nearly the entire population of Caracas passed last night in the streets or on the squares of the city. Slight tremors, followed by severe shocks, recurred at varying intervals and still continue.

### SMALL POX

Has Broken Out in a Number of Indiana Agencies.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 30.—Smallpox has broken out in a number of Indian reservations in the west and it is feared that when cold weather sets in the epidemic will assume a more malignant form. The Indian bureau is forwarding vaccine virus to various agencies.

Vincennes, Ind., Oct. 30.—Samuel Buchanan hit James Pfeiffer with an iron weight and killed him almost instantly in a quarrel over politics at Bridgeport, Ills., today. Pfeiffer was an aged saddler. He leaves a wife. Buchanan is married and well connected. He was arrested.

### REGULAR ARMY

General Corbin Reports to the Secretary of War.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 30.—The annual report of Adjutant General Corbin to the Secretary of War gives complete statistical record of the army of the United States. It shows that the regular army consists of 2,535 officers and 62,861 enlisted men; the volunteer army of 1,545 officers and 31,079 enlisted men; grand total of 98,790, not included in the hospital corps, which is not counted as a part of the efficient strength of the army. During the year discharges from service were 22,592 men; deserted, 3,993. Casualties in Chinese campaign between July and October, nine officers and 200 enlisted men killed. In the statistical tables showing actions in the Philippines from Feb. 4, 1899, to June 30, 1900, together with losses in killed and wounded, the total shows 33 officers and 476 men killed; and 147 officers and 2,676 men wounded.

### DRIVEN TO DESPERATION

Charles Keffer Kills His Wife and Then Himself.

Reading, Pa., Oct. 30.—The sequel to the finding of the body of Mrs. Chas. A. Keffer on the public roadside, eight miles below Reading, last evening, shot to death, developed here today, when the body of her husband was found in a coal chute in the lower section of the city. He eluded the police during the night, and killed himself early today. He was 28, and his wife was 24 years old. In his pocket was a farewell letter to his mother, in which he bade her goodbye. He said that he was driven to commit the crime by his wife, and that their married life had been very unhappy.

### TO THE TOMBS

Alvord Was Committed, and His Case Will Come Up Today.

New York, Oct. 30.—When Alvord was arraigned in police court this afternoon, Fisher A. Baker, counsel for the First National Bank, said that he had secured a warrant from the United States District Court for Alvord's arrest under the laws regulating embezzlement and making false entries. He would much prefer that the prisoner go before the United States court for trial. This was opposed by District Attorney Gardner. After some discussion the whole matter went over until tomorrow. Alvord was committed to the toms.

### Passenger Robbed.

Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 30.—One passenger of the steamer Ohio, just in from Nome, was robbed of \$500, and one died enroute. Ryan McKenzie was falsely reported as being aboard the Ohio. He is being brought out as a prisoner on the Oregon, which will arrive within a week.

### LOWER LEVEL

Was Sought by Prices on New York Stock Exchange.

New York, Oct. 30.—There were only one or two movements of any importance in the stock exchange today. The market fell into a state of semi-stagnation and at times moved sluggishly and irregularly, with no other motive power than the operations of professionals, who sought to take the day's trade.

Buying exhausted itself soon after the opening and prices drifted to a lower level. The tendency of bonds was rather easy, but points of strength developed in the market as the day progressed. ### Negro Lynched.

Birmingham, Ala., Oct. 30.—At Duke sixteen miles north of Anniston, an 18 year old negro named Abernathy attempted a criminal assault on the 14 year old adopted daughter of W. N. Thompson, section foreman of the Louisville & Nashville railroad. The negro was captured three hours after the attempt, identified and lynched.

### MAN MURDERED

And His Body Thrown on the Railroad Track.

Noblesville, Ind., Oct. 30.—An unknown man was found dead near this city today along the Lake Erie and Western R. R. tracks. The body was naked, throat cut, head crushed, one foot amputated and arms broken. He was murdered and his body thrown on the track. He was about 35 years of age, dark hair, little brown moustache; his coat, vest and shirt were found half a mile from the body.
