### Treatment for Insane.

The legislature of Massachusetts has determined to make an experiment with cottage hospitals for the insane. Many experts have come to the conclusion that the true method of treatment is not the crowding of great numbers together, but that of separation and occupation. Even sane people crowded together for a long time, whether in a camp or on shipboard, often become morbid and unhappy. Antipathies are generated, and an unwholesome atmosphere is created which is only cleared of its vapors by change and occupation. What is bad for sane people is still worse for those who are of unsound mind.

## REPUBLICAN PARTY.

Why It Should Be Continued In Power by the People.

### HON. W. W. SKILES, OF SHELBY,

Republican Candidate For Congress From the Fourth District, Talks Straight From the Center on the Duty of the American Voter.

The Republican party should be continued in power because it is the best party that has ever existed in the history of the world. The Republican party was born for the express purpose of carrying out the principles laid down in the Declaration of American Independence in this, to-wit: "That all men are created equal."

It has since the day of its birth maintained and advocated that doctrine. It is in that business today. It will continue so long as it lives and exists as a party to advocate the rights and principles of humanity.

It is the only party that has declared that the man who labors and earns a compensation for his day's work shall enjoy the fruits thereof, whether it be of his hand or brain. Every man under a Republican administration knows that when he earns a dollar, that dollar belongs absolutely to him self, and he has a right to use the same as he may choose. There is no other country on the face of the earth where such rights exist.

The Republican party has declared throughout its entire existence that labor in this country shall not come in competition with the poorly paid labor of the old world. The Republican party has always advocated protection for the American laborer. It has always guarded the laboring man's interests. In the present contest, as well as in the past, the Republican party realizes that upon the shoulders of the workmen of this country rests the destiny of the nation.

It should be continued in power because labor is at the present time and has been through the present administration fully employed. Under Grover Cleveland's administration and the free trade policy, labor was almost completely paralyzed. Men walked idly about the streets, ready and willing to work, but no work was found. The industries of the nation were broken down by the Democratic free trade doctrine, and this country was flooded with products manufactured in foreign factories by foreign labor.

Today all a laboring man has to do is to open his eyes and ears, and he sees and hears prosperity around and about him. No argument can be stronger than that which the working-man actually experiences this day. It is worth a million campaign banners.

We note that on every hand labor is in demand. In many places notices are posted, "Wanted—25, 50 or 100 men," to perform work and labor in connection with certain enterprises. We can not believe that the wage-earner of this country will vote for a change and go back to the days of 1893, 1894 and 1895. In those days the sign most visible was, "Free entertainment," "Free soup-houses," and these institutions in many respects were patronized by able-bodied men by reason of being wholly unable to dispose of that which they had to sell, to-wit, muscle and brain. Will the wage-earner vote to go back to those gloomy and sad days so long as he is in possession of sound mind and body? We do not believe they will. We do not believe they will feign sickness when they are not sick. They will remember the epithet on the old tombstone: "I thought I was sick and was not; I took the doctor's medicine and here I am!" We do not believe they can be prevailed upon to take Doctor Bryan's medicine in the face of what they see and hear on every side. Each laboring man should consider what is best for himself, as one of the first laws of nature is self-preservation. He had an invoice of his condition and his affairs in Grover Cleveland's time. Let him take an invoice of his present condition and surroundings and compare these invoices, and he will conclude when he looks over the same that he is not in favor of a change, but that he is for the re-election of our distinguished and able president, William McKinley.

Mr. Bryan in his speech at Columbus a few days ago, ridiculed the "workingman's dinner pail," and asked the question whether or not the Republican party thought the working-man had only a stomach to provide for, etc. The dinner pail does not stand alone for that which the working-man puts into his stomach, but it stands for millions of dollars in savings banks, it stands for a home paid for, or partially paid for. It stands for all the necessities around and about his home. It stands for the comforts of his family. It is an emblem of prosperity. We believe any man, whether he be a wage-earner or not, will find more consolation in hurrahing for Bryan on a full stomach than hurrahing for Bryan on an empty stomach. A child after once burning its hand by the fire learns a wholesome lesson by actual experience.
