## "TURN HIM OUT,"

And Other Cries Heard in the House of Commons.

London, March 14.—After midnight and during a debate on supply in the House of Commons a scene occurred. Lord Hugh Cecil called for a division, and Timothy Healy, rising asked the speaker whether the noble Lord, the Premier's son, is entitled to interrupt. He addressed some remarks to Lord Hugh Cecil which were drowned in an uproar and shouts of "Send for the police."

The speaker sternly called Healy to order, asking him to stop interrupting. Healy retorted, "I won't; keep the Premier's son in order. You won't turn him out!"

Then turning to Lord Hugh Cecil, he said: "We won't stand nonsense from you." All the time the Nationalists were cheering, laughing and shouting: "Turn him out," "fetch the police," and the like. Eventually order was restored.

## RACE TRACK

Interests Known as the Turf Congress Arranges Circuit.

St. Louis, March 14.—The conference of race track interests known as the Turf Congress today arranged a circuit for the coming season and declared that it has no intention of fighting other tracks, and that horses racing on their tracks would be allowed to run at San Francisco and other tracks. The following circuit was decided upon: Little Rock, March 25-30; Newport, April 6 and 15 days thereafter; Nashville, April 22-27; Demar Park, St. Louis, May 2 and 8-9 days thereafter.

The Canadian circuit opens May 13 and continues without break until Oct. 1. In the meantime owners whose horses develop an unusual class have eastern tracks open to them.

G. A. Tilles and Frank Fowler were appointed on a committee to locate a site in some southern city for a track upon which to give a meeting in opposition to the Jockey Club track in New Orleans, to be ready Nov. 1.
