## REFUSED

### To Accept the Resignation OF THE SENATORS.

### Governor McSweeney will give Them Time

### TO CONSIDER THEIR ACTION

### "Possibly Taken Hastily in the Heat of Debate."

Columbia, S. C., May 31.—Governor McSweeney has rejected the resignations of Senators Tillman and McLaurin to give them time to consider their action.

He says that possibly they have taken the step hastily in the heat of debate without due reflections of the consequences to the people of the state who signally honored them.

Senator McLaurin, who is at Bennettsville, had this to say regarding Governor McSweeney's action: "The unexpected action of Governor McSweeney leaves me completely at sea. I was reluctantly forced into the fight, but when I saw the insulting remarks of Senator Tillman, 'If McLaurin is afraid to meet me, I made up my mind if possible to break off every prong of that old pitchfork and wear him out with the handle before I was through. I will withdraw my resignation as the Governor has requested, because I appreciate the patriotic motives that inspired him, and am willing to unite with him in shielding the people of the state from strife and bitterness.'"

Senator Tillman tonight telegraphed from Trenton: "I have received no letter from Governor McSweeney and therefore do not know upon what grounds or by what authority he acts. He can advise a withdrawal of resignations, but nothing more."

### Heavy Storm in the South.

Vicksburg, Miss., May 31.—A wind storm almost cyclonic in proportions, passed through the southwestern section of Clayborne county, this morning, prostrating trees houses and everything in its path. The five year old daughter of Elijah Copeland, colored, was killed by being caught by falling timbers of a house which was blown down. This was accompanied by heavy hail and the damage to crops will be heavy.

## CABINET REJECTS

### The Cuban Amendment of the Platt Amendment.

Washington, D. C., May 31.—The cabinet was unable to reach any conclusions as to the Philippine tariff situation, as affected by the recent singular decisions of the Supreme Court.

The cabinet held that the amendments and interpretations of the Cuban convention upon the Platt amendment amounted to a practical modification of the Platt amendment, such as was beyond the power of this government to accept.

The message of rejection to be sent to General Wood will insist on the acceptance of the Platt amendment, without amendment or equivocation. The Cuban convention is still in session and the message of rejection will be delivered to it immediately. The administration is confident that the Cubans will make a satisfactory acceptance within a reasonable period.

### BROKE THE QUARANTINE

### Three Men Charged with a Serious Offense in Warren Township.

Warrant were sworn out before Squire N. E. Kidd Friday morning for the arrest of Arthur Scott, Harley Scott and Isaac Kennedy. The affidavits charge the three men with knowingly and intentionally violating the quarantine which was established in Warren township by the Board of Health on May 28, 1901. The facts of the case are as follows:

As there are about a dozen cases, roughly speaking, of smallpox in the adjoining townships of Dunham and Barlow the Health Board of Warren township decided to prevent the spread of the disease by placing the proper quarantine signs and restrictions to prevent residents of the infected locality from crossing the line.

The colored people of Barlow, who live in the infected district, were employed in hauling logs to a saw mill at Constitution. The quarantine notice was respected by one old teamster, who left his wagon and load of logs, not making any attempt to continue on his way. But Arthur Scott, Harley Scott and Isaac Kennedy decided that there was not enough muscular force in that section to stop them and accordingly over the line they went and delivered their logs. The inhabitants of the township became very indignant and warrants were accordingly sworn out before Squire Kidd for their apprehension.

Many people may be exposed by the men's rash and unlawful act. Constable Bennett will take the warrants and endeavor to land the guilty parties some time today.

### IN A PRECARIOUS CONDITION

### Is Miss Polly Merrill who Had a Nervous Collapse.

The condition of Miss Polly Merrill, who being overwrought by the fatigue of the day, suffered a nervous collapse at the Auditorium Thursday night, has grown worse and unless improvement is noted ere long there is danger that she will soon be beyond human aid. The young lady lives near Vincent and came to the city Thursday to attend the services of Decoration. Of a naturally nervous temperament the fatigue and excitement incident to an attendance of both afternoon and evening programs proved to be more than nerves or body could endure. She was the victim of a nervous seizure at the Auditorium during the Memorial services and had to be removed to her home where she is at present in a critical condition.

### COLE INDICTED

### For Shooting William Terry During the Flood.

Parkersburg, W. Va., May 31.—The grand jury of the present Criminal Court finished their labors yesterday and were discharged. There has been an unusually large number of indictments returned, some of them of a highly sensational nature.

The jury after refusing on Wednesday to indict Sid Cole for the murder of Wm. Terry yesterday returned a felony indictment against him.

### OF OUR LEGATION

### At Caracas for the Present at Least.

### MR. LOOMIS WILL BE GIVEN

### Another Position as Soon as a Suitable Place is Found.

Washington, D. C., May 31.—It is officially admitted that Minister Loomis will not return to Venezuela. Loomis has suffered in health at his congenial position. The President moreover is not disposed to expose him again to the attacks made on him in Venezuela because of his execution of orders from the State Department. Mr. Loomis, who is now in Europe, seeking to recuperate, will be given another diplomatic position as soon as a suitable place can be found. Meanwhile Russell will remain in charge of the United States legation at Caracas for a period of time not calculated upon, but likely to be fixed by the attitude of the Venezuelan government.

It is not the present intention of the government to take official notice of the criticisms alleged to have been passed by President Castro, of Venezuela, upon Minister Loomis, in a newspaper interview. The officials cannot bring themselves to believe that the President of Venezuela would willingly reflect upon the personal character of the Minister of another government who according to the official statement made by this government, acted by explicit direction of his own government in the matter which formed the subject of criticism.

### Smallpox Case.

Despite the measures of the Board of Health to prevent a spread of the smallpox a new case was discovered Friday morning. The subject is G. J. Edgcomb.

During the past week he has been ill with what resembled typhoid fever, but the smallpox rash became evident yesterday and steps were taken to confine the disease with the prescribed limits. The Hogan residence on Putnam street, where he has roomed has been put under quarantine and the house has been fumigated. Health Officer McClure immediately took steps to arrange a temporary pest house. The government land on Harmor Hill was chosen as the site for the smallpox retreat and a tent was hurriedly erected and furnished with the necessary supplies. The sick man was removed to the tent, where he can have proper attention without subjecting other people to the disease.

### Saloon Sold.

Negotiation are closed for the sale of the saloon of Herman Jahn to Geo. Bules, who will conduct the business in the future. The consideration does not appear in the public account of the sale.

## A BUSY PLACE

### Mayor Sykes' Reform School Acquires New Pupils every Day.

The two men, Geo. Corner and Daniel Palmer, who were arrested on the charge of stealing junk from the lease of E. Clarke, Jr., at Moore's Junction, had their hearing. Corner was bound over in the sum of \$100 while Palmer was put under \$200 bond. They failed to furnish the collateral and were remanded back to jail.

John Guhley was fined \$5 and costs for drunk and disorderly conduct.

Andrew Shoup and Rosa Dennis had been arrested for living in a state of adultery and unlawful cohabitation on Ohio street. They will be given a trial next week.

## STRENGTH

### Of Market Became very General as the Day Progressed.

New York, May 31.—The stock market developed quite a buoyant tone and the activity was still further increased, giving the market a good deal the appearance again that it offered during the boom period. The strength became general during the progress of the day, but the effect was in part sympathetic and flowed from the conspicuous strength of prominent stocks. The current conjecture pointed to a conclusion that the movement of the principal stocks was due to operations by the Harlman-Rockefeller-Gould element, and to those of the Pennsylvania railroad in retaliation. The market was active and strong and at a rally from a late reaction with many stocks at the top.

Bonds shared in the strength of the stock market on considerable volume of dealings. Refunding 2s advanced 3/4 per cent.
