MILLIONAIRES

From America, Twenty-Two in Number, Call on King Edward.

Had Expressed Considerable Curiosity to See what Manner of Men they Might Be.

Windsor, Eng., June 1.—Twenty-two American gentlemen dressed in deep black, representing many millions of money and vast commercial interests, were guests of King Edward today at Windsor. They are delegates of the New York Chamber of Commerce. The visit was arranged by the London Chamber of Commerce, the president of which, Lord Brassy, accompanied the American party.
The visitors were greatly impressed and pleased by their audience with the King, who was just as interested in meeting them as they were in meeting him. The King had expressed considerable curiosity to see what manner of men these multi-millionaires might be, especially Morgan and Carnegie. As regards the latter the King was disappointed, for Carnegie was unable to

be present. From the King down all officials concentrated their attention to Morgan. The curiosity was not un-mixed with awe. One of the high officials of the household humorously confessed that an inspection of the list of visitors made them tremble lest Morgan or one of the other millionaires should take a fancy to Windsor and buy it.
Each delegate was formally presented to both the King and Queen, shaking hands. This ceremony over, the King asked the American visitors to replace their hats on their heads and both he and the Queen then commenced to chat in the most friendly way with the little group, the King pointing out the beauties of Windsor's chestnut trees and referring to the need of the country for rain and so forth.

ELECTRIC RAILWAY

Systems of Northern Ohio may Soon Come Under One Control.

Detroit, Mich., June 1.—The Journal this afternoon states that the entire street railway system of Toledo will pass into the control of the Everett-Moore syndicate, of Cleveland, within sixty days. Discussing the recent acquisition of several suburban lines by the syndicate, the Journal says: "It is only a question of price, terms and time when all the Detroit and To-

ledo suburban roads will also pass under Everett-Moore control. Everett-Moore has a general scheme to acquire all electric lines between Cleveland and Port Huron, Mich, and from Cleveland south to Wheeling, W. Va., and all their suburban feeders, and when the Toledo city deal shall be completed every city terminal in the lake section of this territory will be under their control."

ELI REYNOLDS ALDERMAN.

EDITOR ALDERMAN

Of the Marietta Register Died Late Saturday Night.

After a lingering illness of two years, Eli Reynolds Alderman, editor and manager of the Marietta Register, died Saturday night at ten minutes after eleven o'clock, at his home, 215 Fifth street, bronchial tuberculosis being the cause.

Mr. Alderman was born in Athens county, August 29, 1833. His father died when he was a small boy, and he then made his home with his uncle, Eli Reynolds, for whom he was named.

He attended the Ohio University at Athens, where he had as classmates David H. Moore and Earl Cranston, both of whom are now Bishops in the M. E. church. On his twenty-first birthday he left college and struck out to make his way in the world. He taught school in the western part of Washington county, for six years was engaged in the mercantile business at Racine, Meigs county, and came to Marietta in 1867, when he engaged in the insurance business.

QUEEN WILHELMINA

Ceaselessly Bowing and Smiling to the Berliners' Friendly Greetings.

Berlin, June 1.—The visit of Queen Wilhelmina and her husband, Prince Henry, of Netherlands, was favored with exceptionally fine weather, though hot, and the bringing of thousands of foreign guests to Berlin. Simultaneous with the presence of French officers, many distinguished strangers, including United States Senator Beveridge, lent additional interest to the different functions. It is remarkable that General Bonnal and his suite, throughout the week, wherever they went, met with courteous reception by the people, even by the commonest laborers. While General Bonnal and party were driving past a group of as-

phalt street laborers they all stopped work and drew up in military attitude and saluted, some of them shouting, "Vive La France, our next ally."
Emperor William, this week is in continuous good humor, smiling and returning the people's hurrahs. For the time the provisions adopted for his majesty's safety were somewhat relaxed at his special request.
Queen Wilhelmina yesterday was greeted by the Berliners' special fever. She was ceaselessly bowing and smiling. In court circles the report that Queen Wilhelmina is in delicate state of health finds credence. It is noted that very little attention was paid her husband, who looked gloomy. The Emperor seldom addressed him, but frequently spoke to the Queen.

CUBAN PRESS

Deplores the Misunderstanding with our Government

And Thinks it Best for Convention to Accept Amendment as Passed by Congress.

Havana, June 1.—The press deplores the misunderstanding with the Washington government and generally admits the possibility of wrong construction being put upon the amendment and that it be best for the convention to take up the question immediately and accept the amendment as passed by Congress. LaLucha says that 85 per cent of the people favor this, but the delegates are at a loss as to what to do.

Regarding the controversy which will surely arise later as to who is responsible, the convention will place the responsibility on the committee on relations and they will blame General Wood and Secretary Root. An effort

is being made today by some conservatives to avoid this crisis by asking the convention to adjourn for a month and in the meantime have the municipalities petition the convention to pass the original amendment. Several municipalities have already taken that action and it is thought that others will fall into line.
The municipal elections passed off quietly. The Nationalists claim the election of Senor Gener, their candidate, for mayor, and a majority of council.

BRYAN'S WAIL

He Admits that the Court's Decisions are Distasteful to Him.

Lincoln, Neb., June 1.—Taking for his text the words, "Emperor McKinley" W. J. Bryan tonight gave out an extended statement bearing on the Supreme Court decision in insular cases. Mr. Bryan frankly admits that the court's verdicts are extremely distasteful to him. He boldly declares that the Supreme Court has joined hands with the President and Congress

in an effort to change our form of government, and he calls on the people to repudiate the verdict.

He says: "By a vote of five to four the Supreme Court declared President McKinley Emperor of Porto Rico and the emperor gladly and gratefully accepted the title conferred upon him. Those who encouraged the belief that the constitution had caught up with the flag were doomed to disappointment."

KANSAS TOWN

In a Terrible Ferment over Murder of a Woman.

Holton, Kas., June 1.—This town is in a terrible ferment today over the discovery of the dead body of Mrs. W. H. Kleusmire, found buried in a shallow trench near her home, north of here. She evidently was murdered. Her head was crushed with a heavy blunt instrument.

Sunday, May 19, the children of the family were away from home on a visit. When they returned their father told them that their mother had gone to Texas. Later Kleusmire left for Texas. Yesterday the children received a telegram from him stating that their mother died in Texas of yellow fever, and he buried her. It is believed that he committed murder.

Abductor Confessed.

He says, she is working as a servant in Buffalo, saving her earnings so that she might marry when she became of age.

Too Real to be Pleasant.
