News of General Interest

The Capital of the Nation.

Washington, D. C., June 29.—President McKinley has the very best reason for knowing that Secretary Hay does not contemplate resigning because of his grief over the death of his son.

Although no definite date has been set for their departure, it is probable that the President and Mrs. McKinley will go to Canton some time next week.

The Italian government has officially informed this government that it does not pay a bounty on sugar exported. This is in answer to Secretary Gage's order to hold up all Italian sugar pending an investigation to ascertain whether an export bounty was paid thereon.

If assurances were needed, in addition to the declaration of members of the Cabinet, that the so-called tariff war with Russia is a comparatively small matter, which will in no way affect the pleasant relations between the two countries.

Hon. Laurits S. Swenson, of Minnesota, United States Minister to Denmark, was in Washington this week on his way home on a vacation. In an interview with President McKinley he delivered a personal message from King Christian expressing his pleasure at Mrs. McKinley's prospective recovery.

Representative Loud, of California, was in Washington this week. He is the author of the bill to cut off certain classes of publications from pound-rate privileges, which was so bitterly

fought, and defeated in the last two Congresses. As he was known to have been with a prominent official of the Post Office Department for several hours, Mr. Loud was asked whether his visit had any relation to proposed postal legislation by the coming Congress.

Secretary Long took Commander Tilly, the naval governor of Samoa, to a Cabinet meeting in order that he might tell of conditions on the island, which only recently became our property. In an informal talk Commander Tilly told the President and Cabinet of the agricultural needs of the island; also of the need of expert trained nurses, owing to the alarming extent of sickness among the children.

Secretary Wilson will combine duty with recreation during a trip to the Adirondacks, which will be partially devoted to looking into some matters connected with the forest reserve in that section.

Commissioner Evans has issued a dignified statement defending his administration of the Pension Bureau and including therein two letters of commendation sent him by Gen. Daniel Sickles, who is now one of his leading opponents, in 1899. He says he has done his duty and administered the laws with equal justice to all, and that he is proud of the results of his four year's work as Pension Commissioner.
