

# BONFIRES

## Were Made From Beds by Wives of Strikers.

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 10.—Monday it is said the executive board of the Amalgamated Association directed President Shaffer, together with Secretary-Treasurer Williams, Assistant Secretary Tighe, and Ben. J. Davis, of the Advisory Board, to settle the steel strike without delay on the best terms obtainable. Since then there has been no action to develop anything to further a settlement, but it is said that President Shaffer is seeking to reopen direct negotiations with the steel corporation, in the hope of getting better terms than those submitted to the Amalgamated Association executive board as a result of the endeavor last week in New York of representatives of the National Civic Federation, headed by President Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor.

The terms secured by the National Civic Federation were neither accepted nor rejected by the Amalgamated Association board. Instead a resolution was passed directing President Shaffer, with the aid of his immediate advisors, to secure the best possible settlement in the least possible time. The terms submitted provided simply for the signing of leases for all union plants of the tin plate, sheet steel and steel hoop companies, except such as have been started since the strike began. The report from New York today that the strike was settled is denied by President Shaffer. He also denied that he was directed to settle the strike.

The combine officials are busy with arrangements to start the idle mill. The strike today in this section was full of exciting incidents, and unless a speedy settlement is effected indications point to exceedingly lively times from now on. Early in the day a gang of bricklayers attempted to enter the National Tube Plant at McKeesport. The strikers, encouraged by their suc-

cess in preventing a thousand workmen from entering the mill yesterday, were on hand in great numbers when the bricklayers made their appearance. The strikers turned them back. No actual violence resulted but had the workmen insisted on the right to enter some persons would surely have been hurt. The tube workers turned back yesterday did not venture a second attempt today, and the plant tonight is dark and idle. It is announced that the Monongahela tin plate works on the South Side, Pittsburg, will be started soon.

In preparation for this move the company this evening endeavored to place in the plant cots and provisions for the workmen. The strikers got wind of the intention of the company when the first wagon containing ice and cabbages crossed the Smithfield street bridge, where it was met by a crowd of women and children, and the driver was told to turn back. Without much ado the driver obeyed. Later a second wagon load of cots, fifty in number, succeeded in making its way as far as Fourteenth street, where women cut ropes holding the load on. The driver continued on the way, the cots dropping off at every turn of the wheels until about forty of them became the property of the women who numbered about two hundred. Some women poured the contents of oil cans over the cots which were piled in two heaps in Fourteenth street and in an instant two huge bonfires were blazing briskly. Twenty cots, which the driver succeeded in getting through, were piled in Fifteenth street, and a cordon of police kept back the crowd which was augmented until it numbered fully two thousand, mostly women and children. Finally the police were reinforced and now the company's property is being guarded by them.

# HUMAN SACRIFICES.

## Lives Given Up at Havana in the Interests of Humanity.

Dr. A. H. Doty, of New York, Declares That Results Obtained in Yellow Fever Experiments at Havana Justify the Means.

Dr. A. H. Doty, discussing the death in Havana of Miss Clara Maas, reiterated his recently expressed opinion that the results achieved fully warranted the experiments that are being carried on in Cuba. "We must not look simply at the deaths of the three persons in Havana," said Dr. Doty, "but we must consider also the incalculable number of lives that will be saved by this absolute proof that mosquitoes carry yellow fever. This was the only way to find it out. We now know beyond question that people must protect themselves by netting, especially at night, from mosquitoes in districts infected with yellow fever, and that they must get rid by drainage and other means of the unsanitary conditions that favor the propagation of mosquitoes. That such precautions against infection by mosquitoes produce the results intended is shown by the fact that this year, for the first time in the medical history of Cuba, there has been no natural case of yellow fever in Havana, and only six or seven in the suburbs. Within six years there have been as many as 500 cases in Havana at one time, with a consequent mortality of from 15 to 35 per cent., and even three or four years ago there were 300 cases at one time. Since the sanitary conditions have been made so very much better, however, and netting has been used so much more, this great advance in the health of the city has come. These precautions against the fever were stimulated, of course, by the belief that the mosquitoes carried the disease, but this belief is now changed to certain knowledge."

### OSSIFIED MAN DOOMED.

Ell Green of Indiana Pronounced Incurable of His Strange Disease by Experts.

The remarkable malady of Ell Green, who has returned to his home at North Judson, Ind., after receiving treatment from medical experts, has been pronounced incurable. Green is going through the process of ossification. His body is rapidly turning to stone. The upper part of his stomach is as hard as rock, as also is the upper part of his arms and limbs. A knife can be run into his body at places without his feeling it. He has been baked in ovens heated at 120 degrees, but with little improvement. His heart is being gradually incrustrated with a stony formation which sooner or later will stop its action. He no longer perspires and his weight is steadily increasing.

The extraordinary conditions in Green's case began to develop about a year ago. The progress of ossification was then slow. Physicians say that when life has been literally crushed out of the human frame Green's body will literally be a stone corpse. The medical experts who have examined Green say there is only one parallel case in medical annals and that was recently reported from Austria. The conditions which contribute to the phenomena of Green's case are an enigma to the medical fraternity.

### TREASURES IN GARRETS.

Rich Finds Being Made in Various Royal Palaces Ordered Cleaned by King Edward.

The overhauling to which the various royal palaces are being subjected, by order of King Edward, is leading to extraordinary discoveries. Garrets and cellars closed for over a century are being cleared and thrown open. Recently a magnificent portrait of Queen Caroline, by Lawrence, was found, along with some other paintings, in a garret at Windsor castle, and now an old fourgon, or velvet-lined van, of great size, filled with splendid silver and silver gilt plate, has been found in a stable at St. James palace, which has not been used for 150 years. The silver in question belonged to Queen Anne and was used by her when giving grand dinner parties at Kew, Hampton court and other suburban palaces, to which the van was dispatched from St. James. The silver was black, and undoubtedly had remained in the van since the time of the death of Queen Anne.

### Trolley to Aid Firemen.

Consul Haynes, at Rouen, in a report to the state department calls attention to a novel proposal for extinguishing fires. He says: "The chief of the fire department of Rouen has suggested to the mayor a novel project in the fire extinguishing service. Inasmuch as this city is traversed everywhere by electric street car wires, it is suggested that there should be provided pumps, driven by dynamo, to take currents by means of a trolley hooked to the street car wires at the nearest point to the fire. If this is favorably acted upon, as seems likely, Rouen will be equal, if not superior, to any European city in the efficiency of its fire service. "Herein is a suggestion for American cities, where street car wires are much more numerous."

## SUNDAY SCHOOL

### Convention of Marietta Township a Grand Success.

Wednesday evening September 14th, was the opening session of the Marietta township Sunday School Association Convention, which met this year with the Sand Hill M. E. Church.

The usual opening exercises were held and then came the address of the evening by Dr. Perry, President of Marietta college. His subject was "The Problem of the Sunday School in the new century." We are sorry we cannot give all of this excellent address and it is very hard to single out the best points, for they were all so good. The Teacher Problem was the first one spoken of and he referred to the institutions for training, and to the value of the Normal Classes. There are many who can teach the A, B, C—who have only spelled out their duties and the school should be graded so as to use those of less training as well as those of greater. One help in the work is to do what we can do rather than what we want to do, and sometimes we must allow some one else to judge of our ability. One trouble is the unwillingness to give time and thought to the work of preparation. It is well to read every thing you can on the lesson, but study to apply what is best adapted to your own class. The problem of adult classes must be met by a radical change, perhaps the method of the teacher studying with the classes will help. Where there are difficult lessons apply different methods to different classes, and have wide variety in method of teaching. In regard to "Higher Criticism," Dr. Perry said: Do as the teachers of science do—teach the truth as it has been taught until the new light has been proven to be right. You can not grow without pasturing on the fields of Holy Writ—neither can you be cultured without study, so we must apply ourselves if we would grow. These are but a few, and crudely given, of the many good things said by Dr. Perry.

The reports as given in the Thursday morning session were inspiring. The Home department reported 192 members this year against 80 last, and the Cradle Roll reported 87. Several Normal classes had been organized, but were dropped through the heated term to be taken up again this fall.

After the various reports had been read we listened with great interest to an address by the Rev. A. K. McCall on "How to make the Sunday School room more attractive." A

mong other things he said we must remember that it is God's home and we must make it beautiful as it is where He meets His people. We must be more careful that there is harmony and that no false impressions are given.

In the afternoon, after the devotional services, Mr. Callender gave a brief talk followed by Rev. F. F. Cook, who gave a fine address on "Deeper Teaching." First as an equipment for deeper teachings we must be better Bible scholars. Must have a grasp of the whole subject and not merely the lesson of the day. Deeper teaching means deeper living.

The Round Table discussion conducted by Will Cain was full of good and helpful things.

The evening session was very much helped by the presence of a quartet from the German M. E. Church, of Marietta, and the music was an inspiration to us all. The feature of the evening was an address by Rev. A. J. Hawk, on "Jesus the Great Teacher." He said in part: He is not to be compared with any other great teacher for He is incomparable. Was a teacher by example rather than by precept, and is perfectly safe to follow as a model. He showed a loving spirit that should especially characterize His followers and He gave only two commandments. He had a compassionate spirit, a forgiving and a prayerful spirit.
