Mr. Dalrymple has the thanks of the Brotherhood boys for a fine new game presented to them.


The Brotherhood orchestra will meet at the home of Mr. Ives next Monday evening at 7 o'clock for rehearsal.

Longer and the Soldiers Monument for Fulton County Draws Nearer to Accomplishment.

We are glad that we can still report progress in the raising of the funds for the erection of the Fulton County Soldiers Monument. We can add at least two names to the Roll of Honor, that of Mr. John Viers of Pike township, who says that his father was a soldier and has contributed one dollar to the fund and Mr. C. E. Brailey who sends us his check for \$5.00 to help the cause along. It would help the cause along if more of us whose fathers were soldiers would take this means of perpetuating the memory of their patriotism and heroism.

Of the eighty-eight counties in Ohio all but two or three have erected monuments to the honor and memory of the Soldiers and Sailors who went from the respective counties. Fulton county is one of the two or three counties which as yet have failed to erect such a monument; in proportion to its area and population, Fulton is the poorest of the counties of the state; the tax valuation in 1913 was \$37,297,330. It is not because of poverty that this memorial has failed to be erected, nor is it because of lack of patriotism among the people. Perhaps it is because the value and desirability of this monument has not been brought clearly before the people of the county. Aside from the debt of gratitude which is due the soldiers and sailors of the Civil War and who might, in part, at least, be paid by the erection of a monument there is the value, which can hardly be over-estimated, which arises from the encouragement to the rising generation to honor the heroes, now fast passing away, to keep sacred their memory and to profit by their example of noble patriotism. The Monumental Association is regularly organized and has up to the present time secured about \$1,000 toward the monument which is to be erected on the court house grounds so that it will belong to the county as a whole. About \$2,000 more are needed for the purchase of the site of a suitable monument, which shall be the free will gift of the people of the county.
