DEATH OF EARNEST BLAIR.  
Ernest Francis Blair, youngest son of Frank and Rosa Blair, was born in Fulton County, Ohio, on February 26th 1877, and died in New York City, on April 12th, 1914, aged 37 years, 1 month and 16 days. The earlier part of his life was spent in and around Wauseon; he attended the public and Normal schools here until 1894, when he went to Denison University, at Granville, Ohio.
