ment of the goods, the other the embroilment of the money produced by their sale each count charging the embroilment, to have occurred in Lucas county. The authorities are quite uniform in maintaining the right of the Prosecutor, where a single offense has been committed, to include a number of counts in an indictment, variously framed to meet possible contingencies that may arise in the introduction of the evidence upon this subject the following pertinent language is used by Wharton: "Every precautionary plea will be necessary to provide for every possible contingency in the evidence; and this the law permits."

"The law permits this multiplication of the counts in an indictment, where each states the same offense variations of details, the same offense, to prevent that failure of justice which might follow, if the prosecution could be confined to a single count, and the proof should vary from the allegations of that count in some essential particular."
 The court forced us to elect, any laymen can see the position of the State. Its case was emasculated had we gone to the higher Court simply for the purpose of finding out if Judge Scott was wrong, the Court would probably have said in language of the Supreme Court in State vs Bailey 50th, O. S. page 640. "Ordinarily, no doubt, the discretion of the trial Court in compelling, or refusing to compel the State to elect upon which of two or more counts in an indictment it would proceed to try the defendant, is not reviewable on error."
 Bailey vs State, 4th, Ohio St., 440; C. R. Proc., 454; Commonwealth vs Sullivan, 104 Mass., 552.
 I am not charging the Court with fraud or selling out, and have not the slightest intention of questioning his motives I simply say that the Court exercised its judicial discretion against the State, emasculated its case, made it futile to go higher, whereas had he exercised that discretion in favor of the State and had Barber been convicted, the case then could have gone to the higher court, if the conviction was wrong it would have been set aside and justice done. If right it would have stood and justice done.
 We were then and still are of the opinion that the Court erred against the State, but as I have said we were absolutely shorn or address. We could have carried up the shell but the meat in the cocoon was dropped.

EXAMINATION OF PROSECUTOR'S OFFICE
 Wauseon, Ohio, August 1, 1914.
 Dear Sir:—We have examined the records at the court house to ascertain if there is any truth in the report current in the county that James B. Templeton has been a failure as prosecuting attorney of this county since the first Monday in January, 1911 and has therefore served up to this time three years and seven months as such official. The common pleas criminal court docket shows that in this time he has tried sixteen cases to a jury and that he lost ten of them; that he lost in addition to the above cases five cases on a plea in abatement, and that in each of these cases he had an assistant to help him; that he won one case on a petition in error from a mayor's court.
 The criminal docket further shows that assistant prosecutors were appointed to aid him in twenty-two cases and that of these twenty-two Mr. Frank S. Ham was appointed in fourteen; that Mr. Templeton notified sixteen cases where indictments had been returned; that in fifteen cases the indicted parties plead "guilty" without trial.
 He has spent a larger amount for clerk hire in his office than any other prosecutor in the history of the county for the same period of time.
 These statements are correct. If you have any doubt about it call at the office of the clerk of court and county auditor and verify them.
