

### Useful Presents for the Little People



A WARM robe of eiderdown flannel is among the most delightful gifts that are to be made for the baby or for the little ones who have outgrown babyhood. Eiderdown flannel is woven in light colors and figured in white with Teddy bears, rabbits, birds and other figures that delight the young. It is the softest and most comforting of materials for cold weather.

### Toys Made in the Home Workshop



THERE are some toys that can be made at home for the smaller children and they are among those that are most durable and most cherished. Among them are Teddy bears, dogs, elephants, rabbits and kittens made of cotton flannel or plush. Rag dolls, printed on strong muslin, can be bought ready to be cut out and made at home. The animals are cut by patterns to be had at pattern companies and are stuffed with sawdust. Small buttons or beads make their eyes and heavy yarn are employed in outlining the mouth or nose or other details.

A small white dog shown in the picture illustrates how well these toys look. He is furnished with eyes made of little black buttons and ears cut from black cloth. A ribbon carrying a bell is sewed about his neck and he is bedecked with a narrow band of red ribbon about his body, tied in a bow at the side.

A clown doll is shown with the head made of ribbed goods like a stocking top. The body is made of blue cambric and the shoes of red. The tail hat is of red also, and the costume is finished with a ruffe collar of white lace. This doll has made of small black beads with eyebrows and eyelids defined with black yarn. His nose is formed by making a short ridge in the face drawn together by a few stitches. A stretch, in red yarn, forms his mouth and a mustache and whiskers are made of black yarn. By separating the yarn into strands, and sewing it about the head below the cap, an abundance of curly, black hair is simulated. The cap is topped with a tiny bell and red and blue yarn represent buttons and embroidery in his apparel.

## GETTING READY FOR CONVENTION

### Temperance Forces in Columbus First of February.

#### ONE THOUSAND DELEGATES

Hundreds of Other Workers Will Attend Conference--Early Action in Legislature On Law to Provide for Recount of Votes--No Denial Made of Charges of Fraud and Corruption in Vote On Home Rule and Prohibition Amendments.

Columbus, O., (Special).--Tentative plans are being made for the annual convention and conference of the Ohio Anti-Saloon league, to be held in this city Feb. 1 and 2. The representation of the convention will be one delegate from each county for each 500 votes cast by that county for the prohibition amendment and one for each fraction of 500. This will make a convention of more than 1,000 delegates.

There will be a large number of visitors aside from the delegates. Workers will be here from every county and much of the time will be devoted to conferences in regard to methods to be employed in next year's campaign. It is to be a meeting for work as well as an entertainment. An interchange of ideas is expected to be valuable, and it is likely that out of the convention will be constructed a system of campaign work which will be adopted generally so far as is applicable to local conditions.

Arrangements are being made to bring to the convention several governors of states now dry, who will recite the tales of the liquor men circulated during the recent contest.

The state board of trustees of the league will hold its annual meeting at the same time, and aside from its regular work the members will outline the policies of the organization for the coming year. League officials believe the convention will be more largely attended and more interesting than any previous gathering of the kind.

Soon after the legislature meets next month a bill will be introduced, providing for contesting elections held under the initiative and referendum. The decision of the supreme court in which it refused a recount of votes in Cincinnati and other cities on the home rule and prohibition amendments, because there is no law providing for such a contest, pointed out the duty of the general assembly in no uncertain language.

"The legislature has seen fit to provide for the preservation of the ballots voted at an election. It has prescribed the conditions under which these ballots can be counted, namely, in case there is a contest of election. It has failed to provide a method for contesting an election under the referendum."

"Section 21 of Article II of the constitution provides that the general assembly shall determine by law before what authority and in what manner the trial of the contested elections shall be conducted. It is not within the power of the court to do so. The failure of the legislature to provide for a contest confers no jurisdiction upon the courts."

Neither the lawyers who appeared against a recount, or the supreme court, denied that there were irregularities in some of the cities in the home rule and prohibition amendments. There was fraud and corruption, but the court was powerless to act because of a lack of law. It is expected that the legislature will promptly remedy the defect and that the people of every part of the state will be insured a fair election and an honest count.

Brewers and prospective saloonkeepers are putting a heavy pressure upon the state licensing board to appoint the county board, so that ordinances may be issued and saloons opened in dry territory before the holidays. The saloon men are anxious for the Christmas trade. The state board has an unusual task before it, and it is not thought new saloons will open until after the first of the year.

More than a score of real law elections are scheduled within the next thirty days.

Ohio editors should be on their guard concerning plate matter now being furnished free by an alleged printer in Columbus, Ohio, who is advertising at Fort Worth, Tex. There seems to be a close alliance between that organization and the liquor interests.

### Fancy Caps Popular as Christmas Gifts



FANCY caps, of many kinds, are among the gifts that may be relied upon to please those who receive them. This year they are shown made for the dancing party, for theater wear, for skating, and, in greater numbers still, for breakfast and afternoon wear. They employ a great variety of materials, the choice depending upon the purpose that the cap is to serve.

A pretty evening cap, shown in the picture, is made of silk and bound with silver braid. A fan of silver gauze at the side is an unusual ornament, poised like a butterfly near the face of the wearer, where two tassels of silver tinsel are suspended. Such a headdress need not be removed at the theater or dance and adds a charming touch of brilliance to the dress.

### Pretty Little Corsage and Hair Ornaments



RIBBONS are used to make the single roses and small bouquets that it is fashionable to wear at the shoulder, over the coat or corsage. Single roses are also made of silver or gold tulle and small blossoms of these materials are used with those of ribbon in the little bouquets. The single metallic rose is as large as the largest natural rose and is set in foliage.

Ribbon in a heavy quality something over an inch in width is used for making roses. Pinks and reds as like the natural flowers as possible are chosen. Hair ornaments are made by winding bonnet wire with satin ribbon in lengths sufficient to extend twice across the head from ear to ear. This covered wire is doubled in the center and caught together at the ends making a double band. At each end of this band a ribbon rose is set in rose foliage. Ornaments of this kind make lovely gifts for young women.

### Pretty Shades for Christmas Candles

PRETTY candle shades for the dinner or luncheon table, are a ribbon rose is set in rose foliage. Ornaments of this kind make lovely gifts for young women.



Candle shades of figured silk, or silk and satin, may be made over small ribbons, or the silk put on in plates or plain or fluted. The thin ribbons are easily handled.

Small wire frames are to be bought ready made and come in a variety of shapes and sizes. Sometimes the frame is made of stiff cardboard, but this is not durable nor as satisfactory as that of wire.

To make shades like that shown in the picture take flowered ribbon or strips of silk a half-inch wider than the width of the wire frame. Lay it in plates, little less than a half-inch in depth, or have it plaited on a plaiting machine. Sew one edge of the plaited strip over the top wire of the frame, crowding the plait close together. Sew the other edge over the bottom wire. Spreading the plait evenly is necessary. Conceal the sewing and border the shade at the same time with its sel braid in silver or gilt.
