

(Continued from page 1) tion as well as to every individual. This she has no right to question, but she does flagrantly and without shame, Asia as well as Europe has been turned into a battlefield—a field where hate and ambition are performing their cruel disasters—a field in which the worst of human nature is manifested day by day.

And what about Africa? The European nations have carried their war there. The Dark Continent has been made their prey. It appears that strength has become their object of worship. Brute force has taken the reins and is driving its armies throughout the three continents, as if it had resolved to burst them wide open. These countries think in terms of slaughter and rapine. They are their meat and drink and the more they murder the better they are pleased. They have gone out to kill, and kill they will. By this date they are hardened to their trade. They have lost those fine aspects of human nature. They are in the field to cut down and plunder. The idea of brotherhood has been uprooted and thrown into the depths. The glorious dream has vanished in smoke and blood. The whole world is staggered, if not helpless. Hanging from its neck there is a weight which seems no one can cast off. The butchering and the pillaging are going on, and who can stop them? Who will dare speak? Who will dare offer a helping hand? Who will dare have mercy? All are dazed in the presence of such ghastliness and horror. No one knows what to do. We are held in the grip of a mysterious power which we cannot explain. Never has the whole world been so helpless as it is today.

After this brief survey of the situation, let us inquire: What will be the effect of it all on the world? Will civilization be benefited by it? Will we have peace when it has come to an end? These questions should be answered, and since they are so significant we are shocked at our lack of them. We wish we could turn away from them and forget them entirely. Our hearts sink within us as we try to find their answers. We are sickened by them. For the effect of this catastrophe upon the world will be deplorable beyond our most daring imaginations. It will break it up in pieces. It will build walls around the various nations that will take ages to tear them down, and civilization will be crippled so long it remains. Peace will not be established when the war is over. Whether the allies or the dual alliance win, this will be true. It will make no difference who wins, this will break it up in pieces. It will build down their arms, but that will not mean peace, the concord of nations and the renewal of good relations. This generation will see no spiritual peace in Europe. Few men of middle age will live to see the friendship of Europe restored. These are mournful, dark words, and when we study them, taking into consideration the little history we know, we can reach no other conclusion. The work of the centuries has been undone. The hopes of philosophers have flown to unknown quarters. The aspirations of the philanthropists have withered. In short, the dream of the brotherhood of man has been slain. The nations at war will be enemies for generations to come. Militarism might be broken by the present conflict, but the passion it has aroused will not be broken for a long, long time.

However, at the cost of Europe we might be humble enough to learn several valuable lessons. There is a beginning to everything, and it may be that the question of dates is of a greater moment to our welfare than to-wit:

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COUNCIL MEETING

West Elm street was rescinded by vote of the council. The subject of a band for the village was introduced and while all the councilmen agreed that Wauseon ought to have a band they were uncertain as to how much the council could pay a band for its services at open air concerts given as in previous years.

The matter of a band will be taken up with business men and interested with business men and is to be hoped that the outcome may be a band that Wauseon may take pride in.

A request was presented from the ministers of the town asking for the privilege of using half of that portion of North Fulton street in front of the Methodist church on summer Sunday evenings for the purpose of conducting open air meetings. There was no opposition on the part of councilmen and such request was granted.

Complaints from citizens in regard to insulting remarks directed at passersby by loungers in front of a pool room on Fulton street were brought to the attention of the council and questions asked and answered disclosed the fact that such insulting remarks were also being uttered in the obnoxious language of the Marshal who was present announced that he would act in such cases in summary manner, he needing no special authority from the council so to act as the use of profane and obscene language on the streets or in public places is a violation of law which renders the user of such language liable to arrest and is punishable by fine or imprisonment. The unanimous opinion of the council was that such language should be tolerated on the streets of Wauseon.

Another matter that was considered by the councilmen before they separated was the condition on Fulton street on Saturday afternoons and evenings resulting from the congested traffic on the streets at those times. Members of the council expressed 'a great deal of anxiety concerning the crossing between the Arcade and Fink & Haumesser's corner where the congestion seems to be the worst, conditions are also had on the out side of the Lake Shore tracks. The council authorized the Marshal to engage extra police to help him direct and control the traffic on Saturday afternoons and evenings and to guard the dangerous crossings.

Drivers of automobiles are requested to observe traffic rules while in town and avoid accidents by driving with extreme caution through the crowded portions of the street, they are also requested not to park their machines in front of hitching rails and to either head in or back in to curb on Fulton street instead of leaving the machine lengthwise with the curb, taking up more room than necessary. There is plenty of room in town for all who come and everybody is welcome whether they come in autos or drive in with teams and horses. The Marshal is anxious to find room for your conveyance whatever it may be, if you can't find a place for it ask the Marshal or one of his deputies and you will be directed to where to leave it. The thing that he council wish to avoid is any accident that would result in injury to persons or property.

The usual claim ordinance was passed and the council adjourned to next Monday evening at which time bids for street lighting will be received.
