LAYMAN'S MISSIONARY MOVEMENT

A meeting for the purpose of organizing and preparing the men of Wauseon to participate in and derive benefit from the Layman's Missionary Movement Convention to be held in the Coliseum at Toledo December 9th to 12th was held in the Christian church last Sunday afternoon. The meeting was addressed by a Mr. Whitney of Toledo and the men of Wauseon organized by selecting Rev. O. P. Hoffman president and Rev. T. E. Ashton secretary of the organization.

The Laymen's Missionary Movement is a unique missionary effort of the men in all evangelical churches in the United States and in 1909 was the means of accomplishing much good along the lines of arousing the men of the churches to an active interest in missionary work.

A series of conventions to be held in seventy of the largest cities of the country is to be held this season and Toledo has been designated as one of the convention cities; between 2500 and 3000 men are expected to attend this three day convention.

A registration committee will be appointed in each of the local churches to canvass the men and urge them to attend. A registration fee of one dollar entitles one to all the privileges of all sessions of the convention. Programs may be obtained from pastors or members of the registration committee. All men are urged to secure a program; noted speakers will bring messages of importance to the convention. Attend if only for one day. Admittance will be by badge which will be sent to all who register.

CORN CONTEST WINNERS.

The Bureau of Junior Contests of the State Board of Agriculture have just issued the official report of the results of the 1915 corn raising contest. There were 197 contestants and the average yield per acre among these contestants was 79.96 bushels. The winners in the four districts of the State whose trips to Washington, Philadelphia and New York will be paid for by the Board of Agriculture are Dewey Hanes, Southwest district, Darke county, 153.761 bu. Erwin Neiding, Northwest district, Lorain county, 143.128 bu. Russel Shifley, Northwest district, Crawford county, 130.06 bu. Dewey Goddard, Southeast district, Athens county, 124.084 bu.

In Fulton county there were four contestants, Carl Trudel is the winner in this county. Following is the official report in Japanese costume.
