SPELLING SCHOOL

Fulton County To Take Part in State-Wide Spelling Campaign—Booster's Club Committee Appointed to Make Plans and Secure Prizes.

The pupils in both the High School and the various are looking forward to a spelling contest about April 1. The schools are taking part in the state-wide spelling campaign that is now on. The climax will be reached at Columbus on June 2, when contestants from the various counties will compete for the state championship. Before that time, about May 10, there will be a county contest held at Wauseon to select the county's best spellers; this pupil will represent Fulton county in the state contest. Interest just now centers in the local contests. Each rural school will select three pupils to take part in a township contest. Each village grade school and each city school will likewise have a contest and the winners in these contests will take part in the county contest. It is the hope that prizes may be ordered the winner in the township and village grade and high school spelling matches—prizes large enough to actively interest a large number of pupils to take part.

A committee has been appointed by the Wauseon Booster Club to arrange all plans for the Wauseon contest and secure suitable prizes for the three best spellers in both grade and high school. This committee consists of Supt. Altstetter, Supt. Perry and H. J. Meister. Any citizen interested and desiring to offer some prize or wishing to contribute to a cash prize will greatly please the committee with any offer they wish to make. It will bring greater happiness to several of our young people and will enlist interest in a worthy cause—better spelling. Do not wait for someone to solicit your support in this cause—no one will ask for help. If you want to help notify the committee.
