CLEAN-UP NOTES
 Let us paint our houses as well as our women.
 Cleaning up will reduce the losses of property and life by fire.
 Insurance rates are reduced by cleaning up the city, because the burning rate is lessened.
 A child who foregoes an all-day smoker to spend the penny for flower seeds, and uses them successfully, grows in grace.
 The increase in self-respect in a community from cleaning up and painting up has a value in comfort far greater than its cost.
 A committee which should be appointed early is that on speakers, and into every gathering during the clean-up month there should be sent a speaker who would ask to be heard on this important effort for the uplift.
 In Cleveland 75,000 copies of a "Clean-up" pamphlet have been given to school children to carry to their homes.
 Much of the cities that had clean-up and paint-up campaigns last spring is now engaged in another.
 On one Sunday during a Clean-up Campaign each minister of the city might make use for his text, "Cleanliness is next to Godliness." The statement is Charles Wesley's, but it is as true as many inspired sentences.

THE GREAT RUBBISH DANGER

The great danger of fire from trash on the lawn, along the back fence and about the barn is from sparks of nearby chimneys. The number of fires caused by sparks from chimneys always exceeds three a day in Ohio.
 The nests of English sparrows, which now occupy nearly every nook and cranny about the eaves of buildings, are very likely to be set afire by sparks.
 The heaviest loss from flying sparks, however, is from their igniting shingles of roofs. It is good practice to paint shingle roofs. Paint not only makes them less likely to rot but prevents the forming of fuzz on them. This fuzz, being a very fine kindling, is easily lighted by a spark. The fuzz which forms on beams and boards in factories, stables, outhouses and fences, is likely to take fire from flying sparks.

TIME TO CLEAN UP HERE

Officials, Business Men, Women and Others Will Work to Make Place Inviting and Healthful.
 Our town ought to have a cleaning such as has never been known here before. The alleys, the lots, the buildings, the lawns, in fact, all parts of the place should undergo general renovation. When it is all over we should be able to give it the title of "Spotless Town." Let us get together and start something. The housewife should get to her spring housecleaning. Mr. Hubby should be beating the carpets. It's the time to Clean Up and Paint Up.
 In other communities North, South, East and West, the Clean-Up and Paint-Up period has always been a big success. For that reason under the present activity and growth, our town should be able to show results that will compare favorably with other communities. They think the Clean-Up and Paint-Up movement is a mighty good one, not only to advertise, but to make the town attractive for the visitor.

CLEAN UP AND PAINT UP

How to Start a Campaign That Will Produce Results in Our Town.

First: Take your telephone in hand—the "fewer the quicker" you'll get started. Talk it over and before you part, agree upon a meeting to be held a day or two later—each of you agreeing to have present at that meeting other certain ones whose interest will be valuable, especially some public officials and some physicians who can tell about the need of public and private cleanliness.
 Second: When the meeting is called, organize at once. Select a chairman and other officers (we suggest enough vice chairmen to include every cooperating organization and interest), and instruct the new chairman to appoint all the chairmen of the various subcommittees within a day or two—these and the officers to constitute the general committee. There should be committees on co-operation, finance and publicity, one to provide wagons for rubbish collection, one to obtain the co-operation of the school children, and one to interest all merchants.
 Adopt a resolution requesting the board of health to proclaim the opening of the Campaign for the Cleaning, Sanitation and Beautification of the town.
 Adjourn, after fixing date for a Get-to-Work meeting a few days later, which all these chairmen and members of their committees will attend to plan their work.
 Third: Write to Chairman Allen W. Clark, of the National "Clean Up and Paint Up" campaign bureau, Kinloch building, St. Louis, Mo., and get free literature telling how to clean up and paint up the town, together with reports of results in cities, towns and villages throughout the country.
 Fourth: Get as many men and women as possible to WORK, each at some specific thing. Don't make the mistake of heaping upon one willing and patient enthusiast all the detail and responsibility of this work. Committees to do specific work, and chairman who will think and work and inspire suggestions and zeal among the members of their committees, are essential.
 You'll want enough committees to put everybody to work; but not too many committees to complicate and confuse. Select a half dozen or more for specific work, and do well that specific work.

OVER 5,000 CITIES TAKE PART.

More than 5,000 cities and towns will this year participate in "opening week" in the National Clean Up and Paint Up campaign, according to Allen W. Clark, chairman of the National "Clean Up and Paint Up" Campaign Bureau, St. Louis. Many of these committees, Clark declares, are thus breaking away from the old established "clean up" or "annual bath" idea and are striving to make their improvement programs continuous performances.
 Files in the bureau's offices, which indicate that the organization has in reality become a national clearing house for the dissemination of community betterment ideas, show that last year more than 2,000 cities and towns made an effort to "clean up and paint up." "This year," commented Chairman Clark, "it looks as though we would co-operate with more than 5,000 communities, in each of which some live civic leader is trying to improve living conditions. Through a majority of these campaigns will start with an 'opening week,' a definite program of activity, we know that the bureau's success has been chiefly due to the fact that we try to get away from the old fashioned 'annual clean up' idea that has become odious to many civic leaders and an annual joke in many cities. The plans of the bureau call for continuous campaigns that bring permanent results and help form worth while civic habits."
