**NOT BET TO FERTILIZE CORN IN THE HILL**  
Farmers will be tempted this spring more than ever before to fertilize corn in the hill because of the high prices of fertilizer caused by the European war, but this practice is false economy, according to Director C. E. Thorne of the Ohio Experiment Station. In the May Monthly Bulletin he explains that while a spoonful of fertilizer applied in the hill may give the corn a good start, spreading fertilizer over all the ground will be profitable in the long run.

Since the roots of the plant extend several feet around, the fertilizer can be utilized better by the plant if spread over all the feeding space. A spoonful put in the hill one used by only a few roots close to it. Director Thorne says, "The plant roots can no more perform their function around a single spoon of fertilizer than can a swarm of bees utilize nectar from one clover blossom though that blossom stood in inexhaustible fountain of nectar."

Again, corn cannot use all the phosphorus, and following crops will make use of the fertilizer when it is spread evenly over the field. The increase in yield of these crops is often as much as that secured in crops fertilized. In one experiment, Wooster fertilizer has been applied to wheat. The fertilizer has increased the yield in the other crops in the rotation of 86 per cent of that secured in the wheat crop. A similar experiment at Stuttgart substitution this increase have 97 per cent. When fertilizer is 1/4 in the hill of corn, it is out of 100 plants in every 100 of them grains and grasses which fail to corn.
