WORTHY MAN IS CALLED
W. L. Boyer's Death Caused A Severe Shock To The Entire Community—The End Came Thursday After Brief Illness—Funeral Sunday.
The news of the death of W. L. Boyer, a highly respected citizen of Angola, came as a shock last Thursday morning. Few people knew that he was ill, in fact his most intimate friends were unaware of his serious condition, for he had only been complaining for a day or two. On last Thursday morning he arose quite early and went to the stable to feed his horses, and when he returned to the house he fell unconscious upon the floor. He recovered somewhat but was later taken with a sinking spell which resulted in his death. His illness was due to an obstruction of the bowel. His funeral in the Christian church at the regular hour of morning worship last Sunday, being an elder of the congregation, was largely attended, and a large number of the congregation followed to the remains to the burial place in the Mt. Pleasant cemetery, near Metz.
