

PARADE PLANS BIG; IS STATE-WIDE EVENT

Thousands Expected to Come to Columbus for Big Procession.

Columbus, O.—Enthusiastic support is being offered from every quarter for the patriotic demonstration to be held in Columbus July 4, which promises to become a state-wide affair with a military and civic parade, attracting thousands of people to the city.

The Columbus Auto Club, through Mr. C. C. Jones, its president, will send machines into the cities and villages within a radius of 60 miles of Columbus to advertise the celebration and urge that delegations be sent for the parade.

The American flag will be the sole emblem displayed in the procession, aside from the banners of the organization or society participating. It is expected that fully 50,000 men will participate in the parade.

Headquarters of Second Regiment May Be Moved There From Ada.

Findlay, O.—The state has accepted the site for an armory offered it by the city of Findlay and will erect a \$300,000 armory at once. It is planned to move the headquarters of the Second Regiment here from Ada and also the regimental band, which is now located at Van Wert.

WAR STRENGTH IS REACHED AT LAST

BY 67 OF 72 COMPANIES IN BUCKEYE MILITIA—McMAKEN OPENS QUARTERS AT COLUMBUS.

FINAL TOUCHES ARE MADE

About 7,500 Infantrymen Expected at Camp Willis Mobilization Camp—Federal Supplies About to Arrive From Rock Island.

Columbus, O.—Gossip among Ohio National Guard officers is that Ohio troops will stay but a very brief period at the mobilization camp.

Only five companies of the six infantry regiments are now below the minimum war strength, two companies in the Sixth and three in the Second Regiment, out of 72.

Second, 1,016, or 73 to the company; Third, 1,125, 81 to the company; Fourth, 1,257, 92 to the company; Fifth, 1,250, 92 to the company; Sixth, 1,143, 83 to the company; Eighth, 1,435, 110 to the company.

Within a day or two the badly needed federal supplies will be ready. They are on the way now from Rock Island arsenal.

Columbus, O.—Ohio has the largest state delegation, with the exception of Illinois, at the national convention of the Anti-Saloon League, which is in session here.

Many Reasons Why This Form of Construction is Absolutely the Best Possible.



One of the best ways to build a poultry house is with a shed roof. In addition to being fine for the poultry it is also easy to build.

The roof can be made of a sheathing which is covered with prepared roofing. The inside wall is made of the roosts are placed in the back part of the house under the roof and are fastened to the droppings board that is placed underneath them.

With the exception of the Pennsylvania railroad, and a few of the other roads the State Tax Commission has fixed the valuations for taxation on railroads in Ohio.

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
