About Wauseon Chautauqua Season Tickets

LOCAL people who have made possible a Chautauqua this season have received from the Redpath Company one thousand \$2.50 season tickets which will be sold for \$2.00 each. When these tickets are all sold no season tickets thereafter may be bought for less than \$2.50. This price will not be reduced from the first day to the close of the Chautauqua. Single admission to the various sessions aggregate nearly four times the cost of a season ticket, so it will pay you to buy a season ticket even though you attend but a few numbers. Single admission fees are specified in the souvenir programs. Season tickets are not transferable except within the owners immediate family. The owners name should be written on each ticket so that it may be restored in case of loss. If at any time during Chautauqua week you forget your season ticket go to the cashier's booth, buy a single admission ticket, take a receipt for same, bring your season ticket and receipt to the cashier at the next session and he will refund the money paid for the single admission. The gate keeper is not allowed to admit you except by ticket. Admission to morning sessions is secured by showing the regular season ticket to the gate keeper. Children, aged from six to fourteen years, may secure season tickets for \$1.00 each while the supply of 200 such tickets holds out. Thereafter the price will be \$1.25. All children are admitted to the afternoon play and story hours free, but must hold tickets if admitted to morning exercises, or afternoon and evening Chautauqua sessions. This year there is to be no Sunday program. However the Chautauqua will remain 8 days, thus making possible a complete seven-day program. Miss Alice Nielsen, soprano is to close the Chautauqua. An opportunity will be afforded to secure reserved seats for that occasion.
