**LAWLESSNESS**

Wholesale Thieving and Robbery Regularly on the Program—Smooth "Get-a-Ways"—No Clues—Increased Protection Necessary.

During the past three or four weeks there has been a regular carnival of thieving and robbery in this section of Ohio. The burglarizing of some store some where within the county has become the regular monthly program in Henry county hogs and beavers taken from the fields in broad daylight, apples gathered from the trees, grain taken from the bins, hay from the barns, poultry from the poultry yards, in fact anything that is loose seems to be considered as spoils for any one who can succeed in getting away with it. Last Sunday night the Frogley Clothing Store at Swanton was entered, 47 suits of gents clothes and 56 overcoats of a leading manufacturer were taken. A Fayette on the same night a meat market was broken into and money and meat taken. The thieves have become exceedingly bold and seem to be very successful in making "get-aways" that leave no clue that may be used by officials to bring the crime home to the perpetrators.

When an occasional arrest is made and some individual is brought to the bar of justice there seems to be the very slightest and best legal talent in the country ready to defend and stand between lawbreakers and the penalty prescribed by law; instance the case of the State vs. O. H. vs. Shafer, in common pleas court last week. Here were goods positively identified as having been stolen from the Saxton Company Store in Delta and found on the premises of the defendant and yet it seemed impossible for the prosecution to so connect the chain of evidence as to fasten the act of burglary upon the accused.

The court could do no other than to entertain a motion on the part of the counsel for the defense to instruct the jury to return a verdict of "not guilty."

Whether the defendant was guilty or not is not the question we wish to raise here; the point is that the people who have perpetrated such crimes as these seem to have the best side of the case in the courts, and the news of such results of prosecutions as that of last Friday travels very rapidly among those who are members of that portion of the underworld engaged in such operations; the inevitable result is an increase in boldness on the part of the people who would rather steal than work.

There seems to be no use in side-stepping the fact that the protection offered by the law is not sufficient in the present conditions; citizens are certainly justified in taking reasonable precautions and measures to protect their property and their lives, and to this end their should be co-operation among the citizens both in town and country.

Individual victims seem to be unable to get much satisfaction after a robbery has been accomplished and their efforts to prevent such crimes seem to be very inefficient.

Organized efforts would unquestionably be more successful in protecting property and also in apprehending criminals and bringing them to account.

Here is something that ought to be taken up The Wauseon Boosters Club and some method or system of co-operation devised in which all the people of the community, town and country might participate.
