LORENZO DOW BAYES Lorenzo D. Bayes, citizen of Wauseon for over half a century, a loyal soldier of the Stars and Stripes and a familiar figure on our streets passed into the Beyond at his home on Beech street Monday morning August 20th. Dow Bayes, as he was familiarly called, the son of John and Nancy Bayes, was born in Holmes county, Ohio, May 18th 1836, and had attained the age of 81 years, 3 months and 10 days. He enlisted August 10th 1862 while in the Fair Grounds in Company I, 38th Iowa Infantry and served through the war; coming to Wauseon in 1866.
