Hon. Datus R. Jones a prominent attorney of Bowling Green gave a most instructive and interesting address before the League of American Patriots at the Court House last Friday evening.

Mr. Jones covered a wide range of current topics and displayed a grasp of the significance of present conditions and their relation to the future of our own relation to the world.

Mr. Jones' address demonstrated the large field of service of such an organization as the League. One of the objects for which the League may work that was presented last Friday evening was a great permanent memorial in the shape of a Community Building in which there might be placed the memorials of the entire county for all the years of the past, the records of the names of all soldiers from Fulton county in all of the American wars.

FLU EPIDEMIC IN OHIO

Recurrent Outbreaks—600,000 Cases—12,000 Deaths in Ohio—Caution on the Part of Local Health Officers Advised—Danger of Re-opening Quarantine too Soon.

Recurrent outbreaks of influenza attributed by state health officials to premature relaxation of local closing regulations, are continuing in various parts of Ohio reports to the State Department of Health indicate today.

These outbreaks, returning in numerous communities after conditions had presumably been restored to normal, are delaying the final extinction of the epidemic which has caused an estimated total of 600,000 cases and 12,000 deaths in Ohio.

The responsibility of these recurrences rests with the local communities, according to the State Department of Health. The action of the Public Health Council, conferring upon local health officials power to restrict closing regulations, when they should consider it advisable, strongly advised caution.

The danger in reopening as soon as a local outbreak appears to have died out, says the State Department of Health, rests in the fact that as soon as theatres, churches and other places are opened, visitors will come into the community from sections where epidemics are still in progress and will spread the disease anew.

SPECIAL APPEAL

To Fulton County people, the Ohio War Savings Committee is directing a special appeal for purchase of War Savings Stamps to the limit allowed by the Treasury Department, \$1000. This request is being made through C. D. Ferry county chairman.

Of \$1000, maturity value, of War Savings Stamps this month is \$844. In December, the last opportunity to buy War Savings Stamps of the 1918 series, the price will advance to \$846.

In issuing the apportionment of War Savings Stamps to an amount equal to \$20 for every person in the state, the Treasury Department called for one purchaser of \$1000 in these securities to every 150 of population. On this basis, the quota for Fulton county has been 166.
