REVIEW PRODUCE SITUATION
FRESH POULTRY An active demand continues for fresh fowl and receipts are somewhat under the demand for current use.

Supply of young chickens continues to increase showing that large numbers have reached the marketing age and are now available. A further increase in the marketing is expected.

The harvesting has to some extent interfered with the even marketing of poultry but this is a condition that should soon adjust itself.

Feeding stations in the country show a large amount of young chickens on feed and more labor will be employed in preparing the chickens for market.

EGGS The present warm weather prevailing in producing sections has resulted in some deterioration in the general quality of eggs.

The production is holding up remarkably well and has in fact been somewhat in excess of the need for current consumption.

CREAM There has been no change in the situation on cream during the week. The quality has deteriorated on account of the hot weather and the delay in handling due to farm work.

It is especially important during the heated season of the year that the cream be delivered frequently to the shipping stations and that it be properly taken care of on the farm.

Many creameries are now buying cream on a graded basis and paying a lower price for cream that does not grade up to No. 1 standard.

2 butterfat is usually caused by not cooling the cream quickly, or by not delivering promptly to the shipping station.

club plan for the many countries. For that reason many of the Senators in Washington refuse to aid in the forming of this club.

George Washington, the Father of His Country, warned us not to form clubs with countries across the sea because it would get the United States into a lot of trouble.

They also say that if we join this world club, we shall lose our independence which you know from school history our fore-fathers gave up their lives to obtain in 1776 from England.

We would be governed, so far as our relations with other countries, by a body of men representing the countries in this club and our Government would have to agree to do whatever these men decided.

When the men representing each country in this club, meet to decide matters, each country would have one vote. Every member of this club would have to agree to whatever was decided.

The United States would get one vote, Belgium would get one vote, but England controls so many countries she would get six votes.

One for England herself, one for Canada, one for Australia, one for South Africa, one for New Zealand and one for India.

"Why, Uncle Ted," said Jack, "if we only get one vote and England gets only one vote, what is the difference? Canada and Australia are far away from England?"

"That is just what I want to explain to you. These other countries, such as Canada, and Australia which I counted in as making the six votes for England are all colonies of England just like Alaska and the Philippine Islands are part of the United States.

When it came time to vote, they would all vote with their mother country and in that way they could, by their votes, make the United States share their troubles and wars whether the United States wanted to or not."

"Wouldn't that be a bad thing for the United States?" spoke up Ruth.

"It would be a very bad thing for the United States to join the league or world club, and that is why, Jack, the big Senators in Washington are refusing to help make the United States join. President Wilson wants us to join no matter what it means to us but the Senate must decide because our laws say so, and most all the Senators say that we will not join the club and send our soldiers all over the world to risk their lives fighting the battles for other people.

Now it's bed-time and I am tired from my trip. Next week I shall tell you about another reason why

The Senate does not like the peace treaty which our President signed in France. It is all about China and sounds like a fairy tale with a big dragon and everything."

NO CONSENT REQUIRED
Mr. Wilson holds to the view that any reservation the Senate may make in the peace treaty must be acceptable to the allies, and those who have talked with him say that the plain inference of his remarks was that if amendments to the treaty are made he will submit them to the foreign governments, and attempt to charge the delay incident to such negotiations to those Senators who sought to amend.

If that is a correct interpretation of the President's mind and he undertakes to carry out such a program, he will lay himself open to grave charges that may well invoke the power of impeachment possessed by the House of Representatives.

Mr. Wilson must bear in mind that no foreign government is a part of the treaty-making power of the United States. The enemies of Germany gathered together for mutual counsel in the framing of a treaty. Those nations that had entered into a previous agreement not to sign a separate peace were bound to take joint action with each other, but the United States has always been free to act independently.

The making of peace is a closed incident to those countries that have given their consent to the treaty. It remains for the United States to accept, amend, or reject the treaty that the President has presented to the Senate.

It is Germany's privilege to accept the amendments of the United States or not as she sees fit, but for any other nation to inject itself into the negotiations between this country and Germany, and attempt to dictate to the United States Senate the form its amendments shall take would be an unheard of piece of international effrontery.

Even if the President should invite other nations to pass judgment on what the Senate had done, it is unthinkable that his invitation would be accepted.

Such a course of action on the part of Mr. Wilson would not only be a supreme insult to the Senate, but would arouse the people to such a pitch of militant resentment that they would demand drastic action by the House.

Surely the framers of the Constitution could have contemplated no greater "misdeemeanor" on the part of the President than the soliciting of foreign interference in the making of our treaties.
