

NEW MANUFACTURING PLANT FOR WAUSEON

Prompt Action—Commerce Club Officers Put Wauseon Proposition Up To Screw Products Manufacturing Company—Company Accepts—

In the report of the special meeting of the Commerce Club which appears in another column of this issue mention is made of the action taken by the club in regard to securing the location of a Screw Products manufacturing plant in Wauseon. The officers of the club communicated with the people interested in the new plant and on Tuesday of this week a representative of the company came to Wauseon and in part of the company accepted the proposal of the Commerce Club to pay there a bonus of \$5000, said bonus to be apportioned as a percentage of the pay roll of the plant in Wauseon during a period of five years. The representative agreed to return to Wauseon on Saturday of this week, sign contract or agreement to locate the plant here and deposit \$5000 in the local banks as a guarantee of their good faith. The company will purchase the site located west of the Superior Iron and Manufacturing Company plant at the E. T. & I. and Wabash railroads crossing. The committee appointed by the Club consisting of the president, F. J. Spencer, F. R. Gilford and C. F. Orth acting in accordance with instructions from the Club have selected the following twelve members to act with them in carrying out the proposal which has been accepted by the company: George Howard, Otto Funkhouser, John Hatt, C. E. Wager, A. E. Harger, R. J. Bismontette, W. C. Fink, Fred Edgar, Ed Scott, H. F. Dimko, C. L. Goff and Howard Lyon.

Early next week this committee will solicit the business and professional men of the town for subscriptions to meet the bonus agreed upon by the Club.

The new plant will not employ a large number of men the first year not to exceed twenty-five men; local men will be employed as far as possible to do so. The company plan to begin the erection of the first building of the plant at once and will install machinery and begin operations as soon as possible.

THE PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY BALLOTS

Presidential Primary Election Tuesday April 27th, 1920—Candidates of the Parties—Who's Who On the Ballots—To Vote Is A Duty.

Never in the history of the United States of America has there been a more critical state of affairs within the nation than now exists and never was there a time when it was more important that the citizens of the nation should take an active interest in the policies of the government and the choosing of leaders and officers to determine the policies and administer the affairs of government than now. It is time for everyone who makes any pretensions to being a 100 per cent American to remember that this is still nominally at least, a government of, for and by the people and that the casting of intelligent well and carefully considered ballots is a duty, an obligation, as well as a privilege of American citizenship.

The question as to whether women shall vote in Ohio April 27th is still unsettled and probably will remain so until April 20th.

Personally we sincerely hope that they will be permitted to vote, because we have confidence in the intelligence, womanhood of the State that they will give careful consideration to the problems that confront the nation, careful study of the qualifications and characters of the office of President and that they will cast an intelligent conscientious ballot.

The Candidates of the two great political parties are before the people. Here in Ohio the Democratic party seem to be solid for James M. Cox, though of course there will be votes for other candidates.

All delegates and alternates on the Democratic tickets are announced as Cox for first choice and Campbell as second choice.

Candidates for Delegates at large to National Convention are Judson Harmon, Edmond H. Moore, Alton Pomeroy, James E. Campbell four to be elected.

Alternates are Lazard Kahn, George S. Long, John L. Snuff, William Green.

District delegates and alternates are Harry L. Conn, Geo. T. Farrell, Daniel M. Bailey alternates, W. N. Shaffer, F. W. Reiter. Two district delegates and two alternates to be elected. Delegates to the Democratic State Convention are W. C. Pink, Fred E. Pilliod, W. J. Clark. Three to be elected, only one candidate an alternate to the State Convention appears on the ticket, Sam D. Nofziger; three are to be elected.

The Republican party has a line of good men as possible presidential candidates. Johnson of California, Lowden of Illinois, Harding of Ohio and Wood of the U. S. are all able men and we believe that

COMMERCIAL CLUB IN ACTION

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The special item of business brought before the club was a proposition from a "Screw Products Manufacturing Company" relative to the location of said firm in Wauseon. The proposal after selling what the company would guarantee to do, asked that the people of Wauseon donate to them a site for their factory building, help them to secure a good roadway to their plant and pay them a bonus of \$5000 to be paid within a period of five years.

The club members were not in favor of purchasing the land for factory site, but agreed upon an answering proposition to subscribe and pay a bonus of \$5000 to be based on the current pay roll of the firm. Payments continued over a period of five years until the entire \$5000 is paid.

Mr. Spencer reported that he had secured an option on the site which the company have selected as desirable for them; it is located at the crossing of the Toledo, Toledo and Ironton and the Wabash railroads at the northwest corner of the town; a roadway to the site can be made from the corner of Willow and Zenobia Streets.

By vote the Club selected Messrs. Spencer, Guilford and Orth to take charge of working out the details of the proposition and put them in execution. These three men to select twelve others who shall be associated with them in carrying out the plan. Mr. Spencer was of the opinion that the firm would accept the proposition of the Club and locate in Wauseon. The Screw Products Manufacturing Company state that they will employ about twenty-five men to start with and that number will be gradually increased.

The question of housing was brought up and thoroughly discussed. Mr. L. M. MacDonald of the Wauseon Housing Corporation stated that 50 houses were needed in Wauseon.

LOCAL SOLDIER MEMORIAL

The erection of memorial tablets at various county seats throughout the country for soldiers and sailors who lost their lives in the World War is provided for in a bill introduced by Senator Warren G. Harding of Ohio. The measure has been referred to the Committee on Military Affairs for consideration.

FOR CASH BONUS

The Ways and Means Committee of the House has voted 15 to 6 in favor of some form of cash bonus for former service men. The details of the legislation have not yet worked out, but a subcommittee will be put in charge of the matter, with authority to prepare a measure for submission to the full committee in the future.

FOR RELIEF OF STORM VICTIMS

There will be a citizens mass meeting at the Court House in Wauseon at 2 o'clock next Sunday afternoon for the purpose of raising funds for the relief of those who have been reduced to sore need in Fulton County as the result of the devastation brought by the tornado of March 28th.

Bryan Chapter of the American Red Cross has contributed \$400 for the relief of Fulton County sufferers. The Wauseon Chapter will doubtless also contribute for this purpose.

The following is quoted from Ridpath's History of the United States, vol. 14, p. 5738, published in 1906:



"General John R. Brooke was placed in command of Cuba as Governor General. On December 20th, 1899, he was succeeded by General Leonard Wood. On January 12th, 1900, General Wood issued an order to define the relations between the military and civil jurisdiction, in which the military, which had been practically supreme until that time, were forbidden to interfere in the conduct of civil affairs except in matters of sanitation."

Leonard Wood's civil administration of the island of Cuba is a white page in the colonial and foreign history of our nation.
