CHINCH BUGS

Stop, Look, Listen! Chinch Bugs are going to be very plentiful this year according to all reports. At present they may be seen in barley, oats and wheat about the base of the plants. In every farmer in Fulton County should examine his small grain for chinch bugs. If they are present steps should be taken at once to protect corn in adjoining fields. Soon after the small grain is cut the bugs migrate to the corn fields. The best way to protect the corn is to make a tar line barrier between it and the small grain as follows: plow a furrow throwing the dirt away from the corn. Drive a wagon back and forth on the side next to the corn to pack the soil up next to the furrow. Then run a line of tar along the wagon track just at the edge of the furrow. Dig a post-hole in the furrow about every thirty feet to trap the bugs. The county agent will be glad to assist you if called upon. Gas tar was obtained last year at the gas company in Napoleon for 10 cents per gallon. R. O. Calve, County Agent.

CRAFTY J. BULL

From official sources in Great Britain a denial has been issued that Great Britain contemplates a repudiation of her war debt. This denial is said to have been issued in answer to rumors which were said to have been circulated in the United States. This denial is really the setting up of a straw man for the purpose of making a public display in knocking it down. No one has ever charged or even intimated that Great Britain proposed to repudiate her war debt. It was charged, and with apparent good reason, that Great Britain desired to involve the United States in a League of Nations which would ultimately bring about a pooling of the war debts under which plan the United States would assume a larger proportion of the total than she is now called upon to bear. Some months ago, Mr. John Maynard Keynes, formerly an official of the British Treasury, published a book in which he proposed that the United States voluntarily cancel its claims against other Allied nations and that Great Britain do the same. This, if adopted, would throw an immensely larger burden upon the United States and result in an advantage of many millions to Great Britain. This was not a proposal on the part of Great Britain to repudiate her war debt; it was merely a crafty scheme to induce the United States to cancel a large portion of the debt, thus accomplishing by diplomacy what could not have been accomplished by attempted repudiation. Great Britain's denial of any intention to repudiate her debt will not serve to make the American people less vigilant in opposing the scheme to bind this country to a League of Nations' Covenant under which practically the same thing would be accomplished.
