## HALF MILLION CONTRACT CLOSED

### The Automotive Body Company of Wauseon Close Contract With the Briscoe Motors Corporation of Jackson, Mich., for Car Bodies.

The largest order taken to date by the Automotive Body Company was secured last Monday when representatives of the Wauseon Company closed a contract with the Briscoe Motors Corporation at their offices in Jackson, Michigan for the manufacture of some thousands of touring cars, roadsters and delivery bodies the total contract price aggregating well over \$500,000.00. The order includes touring cars, roadsters and delivery cars, and seats for delivery cars. A considerable portion of the order is to be delivered before January 1st, 1921, which will necessitate increasing the working force at the plant to at least 75 men at once. Mr. Bixler, General Manager states that by March 1st the company should have at least 200 operatives in order to fill the orders that are now on hand or being received.

The Lorraine Motors Corporation of Grand Rapids, Mich., are asking for estimates on 2000 bodies and the Skelton Motors Corporation of St. Louis, Mo., are asking for estimates on 2000 bodies. The amount of orders the company may have seems to be limited only by its capacity to produce and that capacity is being increased as rapidly as circumstances will permit.

The growth of the Automotive Body Company has been phenomenal and it gives every promise of developing into an industry of such magnitude that it will give Wauseon a place among the industrial centers of this section of the State. If ever in the history of Wauseon there was an opportunity to develop and enlarge the town, it seems to us that opportunity is offered now. By getting back of the Automotive Body Company co-operating, boosting, helping financially as they may be able the citizens of Wauseon may increase the population, the business, the profits, the valuation of real property and the industrial and social well being of the town. It requires no extensive or intensive knowledge of business to enable one to understand that the Automotive Body Company must have capital in order to buy the material and employ the labor necessary to fill the orders which they have and on which they can realize no profits until such time as they can deliver the goods ordered. The present management have demonstrated their good faith by investing their own money as well as their time and labor and bringing the business to a paying basis before asking others to share with them in the extension of the business to meet the growing demand which exceeds the limitations of the working capital of the founders.

But this is only for those citizens who have money they may conveniently spare for investment, and the point is to invest your money at home where it will help your own community as well as insure profitable returns to yourself; there are many other ways in which citizens may co-operate; help in the matter of housing; the people who must be brought into town represent skilled labor, they make good citizens, they enter with you into the social and religious life of the town. ## REGULAR MEETING OF THE COUNCIL

All members of the Village council were present last Monday evening at the regular meeting; there was the, (in these days) usual struggle with the financial problems of the corporation which involves the transfer of moneys from one fund to another in order to get sufficient cash together to meet pressing obligations in some one of the departments of the village government; it requires expert finance ability not to mention patience and persistence which the councilmen, mayor and clerk with the assistance of the City Solicitor are furnishing. At the same time thankful that they are still able to keep all departments of the village going, even though unable to make the improvements and repairs that are imperative, as they would like to do.

Mr. A. J. Fields was present to report his request for sidewalk grade along his premises on Wood Street and call attention of the need of additional street lights on that street. The sidewalk grade was ordered given at the earliest possible date and action was taken to secure the necessary light. A new street light was also ordered for West Superior Street. A motion to transfer funds in order to meet bills passed due was carried.

Complaints were presented through one of the councilmen regarding the so-called "Punch Board" in use in certain of the business places, as gambling devices. The marshal was instructed to notify those firms using said devices to discontinue using them at once.

An ordinance to authorize the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs to purchase an additional acre of land from the Jay Funk farm to be used in building the reservoir for the new water works plant was presented and placed on its first reading. Claim ordinance was read and passed and Council adjourned to its next regular meeting December 6th.


