HOUSE BILL NO. 620

BETTER KNOWN AS THE CRABBE ACT NOW OPERATIVE—UP TO LOCAL OFFICERS TO ENFORCE PROHIBITION LAW.

By the vote of the people of the State of Ohio on November 2nd, 1920 the Crabbe Act, House Bill 620, an Act "To prohibit the Liquor Traffic and to provide for the administration and enforcement of such prohibition" was made effective and its provisions are now in force as a law of the State of Ohio.

Section 2 of this act gives the following interpretation:

1. The word "liquor" or the phrase "intoxicating liquor" shall be construed to include alcohol, brandy, whiskey, rum, gin, beer, ale, porter and wine and in addition thereto any distilled, spirituous, malt, vinous, or fermented liquor and also any liquid or compound whether or not same is medicated, proprietary, or patented and by whatever name called containing one half of one percent, or more of alcohol which is fit for use for beverage purposes. Provided that the foregoing definition shall not extend to de-alcoholized wine, nor to any beverage or liquid produced by the process by which beer, ale, porter or wine is produced, if it contains less than one half of one percent of alcohol by volume and is made as prescribed in section 37, title II of the Act of Congress, known as the "National Prohibition Act" passed October 28th, 1919.

2. The term "given away" and the term "possess" shall not apply to intoxicating liquor in a bona fide private dwelling.

3. The word "person" shall mean and include actual persons, firms, associations, co-partnerships and corporations. The term "alcohol" shall mean ethyl alcohol. Whoever knowingly sells, furnishes or gives away wood alcohol or any preparation or compound containing wood alcohol to be used for beverage purposes and death results therefrom shall be guilty of murder.

Section 3. No person shall, after the passage of this act, manufacture, sell, barter, transport, import, export, deliver, furnish, receive, give away, prescribe, possess, solicit or advertise any intoxicating liquor, except as authorized in this act. Linear and liquor preparations and compounds for non-beverage purposes and wine for sacramental purposes may be manufactured, purchased, sold, bartered, transported, imported, exported, delivered, furnished, received, given away, possessed, prescribed, solicited and advertised but only in accordance with the provisions of title II of the Act of Congress.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful to have or possess any liquor or property designed for the manufacture of liquor intended for use in violation of law or which has been so used and no property rights shall exist in any such liquor or property. A search warrant may issue and proceedings had thereunder and such liquor, the containers thereof and such property so seized shall be subject to such disposition as the court may make thereof. No search warrant shall issue to search any private dwelling occupied as such unless it is being used for the unlawful sale of intoxicating liquor, or unless it is in part used for some business purpose such as store, shop, saloon, restaurant, hotel or boarding house.

Section 5. Fixes the penalties for violations of this law: at a fine of not less than one hundred dollars nor more than one thousand dollars for the first offense. Not less than three hundred dollars nor more than two thousand dollars and for the third or subsequent offenses, not less than \$500 nor more than two thousand dollars and imprisonment in the state penitentiary not less than one year or more than five years.

The penalties provided do not apply to a person for manufacturing, selling or non-intoxicating cider and fruit juices exclusively for use in his home and nothing within the act is to be construed to prevent the sale of vinegar.

Section 6. Designates courts of jurisdiction as any Justice of the Peace, Mayor, Municipal or Police Judge, Probate or Common Pleas Judge within the county with whom affidavit is filed charging a violation of any of the provisions of this act and gives them final jurisdiction to try such cases upon such affidavits without a jury except where imprisonment is part of the penalty. It is not necessary that any information be filed by the prosecuting attorney or any indictment be found by the grand jury. Fines and forfeited bonds are divided one half to the State treasury and one half to the township municipality or county where possession is held.

EDUCATIONAL NEWS

The following schools have one hundred present enrollment in the Northwestern and the State Teachers Associations: Fayette, Lyons, Metamora, Fulton Centralized, Delta, Wauseon, Chesterfield Centralized and Archbold.

EDUCATIONAL NEWS

3. The right to advance professionally.
4. The right to face sickness and old age without fear.
5. The right to feel self-respecting and to enjoy social esteem.
