Another Big Cut
The annual legislative appropriation bill, providing salaries for most of the Federal employees in Washington, has been reported to the House carrying a total of \$12,728,438. That figure is \$23,724,196 less than the estimates of the Democratic administration and means the discharge from the Federal service of 12,183 clerks at the end of the present fiscal year, June 30, 1921.
