TO ALL REPUBLICANS. The Republican Convention made no nomination for the office of Probate Judge, and referred the matter to the Central Committee.

But that subject is exhausted. We would like to inquire of our Democratic friends if they really paid to employ Carey at \$600 per speaking, and then to put the whole affair under the guise of a working men's movement.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—The public debt statement is as follows: Debt bearing interest in coin bonds at 5 per cent., \$221,889,300; bonds at 6 per cent., \$1,808,347,260; total, \$2,030,236,560; interest, \$12,127,660 33. Debt bearing interest in lawful money certificates at 3 per cent., \$50,345,000; navy pension funds at three per cent., \$14,000,000; total, \$64,345,000; interest, \$1,242,262 50.
