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PHOTOGRAPHY.

"To Save Time is to Lengthen Life" Photography, or Phonetic Short-hand, derives its name from two Greek words—Phos, a voice, and Grapho, writing—writing by sound.

Photography was invented by Isaac Pitman of the city of Bath, England, in the year 1837. It is a phonetic representation of the language, by means of which, when one has thoroughly mastered it, he can follow the most rapid speaker, with swift-winged lips, and photograph upon paper each word and sentence as it falls from his lips...

Photography is based on an alphabet of the simplest and most possible to represent the elements of the language. Being philosophical, it is easy to learn; its principles can be understood at one lesson, and an accurate practice for six months will enable a good student to carry from 120 to 175 words per minute, and additional practice will give the power to write 200—the average rapidity of speech in 120 per minute.

Photography is valuable, but to students, professional men, especially clergymen, lawyers and authors, and indeed to almost every one who writes at all, it offers invaluable assistance. The student at college cannot afford to dispense with its aid. Any medical student can testify to the unreplaceable value to be attached to such a "Text Book." The lawyer would save himself years of drudgery by the employment of Photography. Thos. H. Benton, upon being presented with a verbatim report of one of his speeches, pronounced by a little boy, said, "Had Photography been invented forty years ago, it would have saved me twenty years of hard labor."
