To the Farmers of Seneca County - Let every farmer try to raise flax the coming season. Prepare the ground as soon as it can be worked. Flax seed can be sown as late as oats. Plow as for other crops, and harrow well, then sow also one bushel to the acre, broadcast, and cover with a brush-harrow. Make the ground as smooth as possible that the crop may be taken off close to the roots, which will give more straw to the acre, and a better article, and the better the article the more money it will bring. When the flax begin to turn brown and the leaves have dropped from the stem, it is time to cut the flax or cut the flax. If cut with a machine it need not be kept in a straight condition, as it can be used for rope. When the flax are perfectly dry, the seed may be taken out. The best way is to let the horses tread it out on a barn floor. You may market the straw in any condition you prefer. Seed can be had at Geo. Sawyer & Co., near the Depot, Tiffin, O.

P. S. In case you don't take the straw to market at once, stack it well to keep dry till a more convenient time. A crop of flax will prepare the soil for wheat as well as to follow.
