Death of Orvin M. Pittenger.—It is our painful duty to announce the death of Orvin M. Pittenger, who died at the residence of his parents, in this city Thursday morning, May 23, 1872, aged 22 years, 4 months and 21 days.

Subject of this notice lived his life in the office and worked for his present proprietors at different times within the last four years. In his relations with us we always found him a faithful and honest man, gentlemanly in his deportment and respected and loved by all who came in contact with him. In all the time he was employed by us our relations were most pleasant—and he received more than our respect.

In his associations with society generally, Orvin commanded the respect and love of his associates and the circle of young people was incomplete without his presence.

His sickness was of several months duration, during which time he suffered severely with a lung disease. He had hemorrhages almost without number which finally overcame his otherwise strong constitution, and he died in the beginning of what would have been a useful life.

His funeral on Sunday last was attended by a large concourse of people, and it was noticeable among them was a large proportion of persons of his own age and his associates.

We mingle our grief with that of his family, for if they mourn a dear son, we have lost a friend. With the many friends of the family, we unobtrusively tender our hearty sympathy in their great grief at the loss of a dutiful and beloved son.

He is connected with the paper mills at that place, not only peculiarly but also in a business capacity. He thoroughly understands the business in all its branches.

Mr. Peebles examined several locations for mills and the quality of the water. All were pronounced excellent, and he was satisfied that no better place than Tiffin could be found in which to manufacture print, wrapping and bagging papers. He went home favorably impressed with our city, and with a proposition for the organization of a joint stock company with a capital of \$50,000—he to take stock and superintend the business. He is a careful business man and he shall hear favorably from him.

Whatever Mr. Peebles may decide to do in the matter, we are satisfied that our citizens are determined to have a paper mill.
