—The annual settlement of the Trustees of Perryburg township, as shown by Treasurer Wittmann's report published last week, makes a very favorable showing for the practice of economy and efficiency in this department, as compared with ring rules some years ago. The total expenditures for all purposes of \$2,569.34, as shown by the report, is reduced still lower by about \$400, by deducting \$200 in excess of outstanding orders last year over this, and \$200 due from the county for the year ending March 31. The total balance in the treasury of \$4,272.93, is ample for the expenditure of another year without further levy. Referring to this style of management of the Toledo *Bea* says:

The sum total of all the disbursements from the Perryburg township treasury, during the year ending March 31, was equal by several hundred dollars, to the annual salaries of the trustees, in the good old days, when machine politics reigned supreme; when the honor in the treasury at the close of the fiscal year was wont to be equitably divided among the faithful, and the services of the expert bookkeeper were engaged, whose principal merit consisted in his skill in covering up dark transactions; and, after arranging the accounts in legal form, the best possible manner to present any case from having anything by them, would render the final balance by the mysterious error, "all paid in and all paid out," Perryburg (both in reality and in appearance) had a most expensive experiment in the past, and she ought to be able to appreciate, and willing to recognize, the services of a faithful servant now, when she secures one.
