

BOSTON AND LOWELL.

Headquarters train of eleven coaches, eight pullman and three ordinary, left Toledo Saturday evening, nearly on time, with nothing unusual occurring but having to wait for trains in the way. The car we occupied had a quiet, pleasant company, mostly of Toledo people, arrived at Newburg, N. Y., before sunrise Monday. Had a beautiful view of the Hudson and soon entered the land of steady habits. At Danbury, where the first stop in Connecticut, made we met a royal welcome. Citizens had provided an abundant supply of fresh sandwiches and barrels of excellent lemonade, which was given freely to all. It proved a very acceptable refreshment to many who had found it impossible to get anything at places we had stopped, owing to the great crowd of hungry ones. The agent of the Railroad told me they had thus fed some 1,200 and I have no doubt more than that number were following us. Good for old Connecticut.

Arrived at Boston about five o'clock some 10 hours late. The "hub" was too much of a centre and needed more room. The crowd was immense; streets almost impassable. Street cars unable to move but a few steps at a time, so that we were about an hour going only three fourths of a mile. Decorations of buildings were magnificent. G. A. R. "vets" had a grand welcome by everybody. I saw a number of men who seemed to be drunk, but learned it was only the effect of walking the crooked streets of Boston—I did not venture walking.

Boston has many places of interest to every patriot — Fannin Hall, Bunker Hill, the Common, etc.

Lowell, our destination, is a city of about 89,000 population according to the late census and a very pleasant city, with immense manufacturing interests. Perhaps a few words may be of interest to some of your numerous readers. Nearly everybody, at sometime, wears some of the cotton cloth or prints or hosiery or under garments made here. Multitudes also use some of the carpets manufactured here. The amount of the capital invested in various kinds of manufactures is \$14,650,000 — the larger part in cotton cloth and carpets. Number of spindles, 869,226; females employed, 11,393; males, 7,799; yards of cotton cloth per week, 5,005,756; prints per week, 1,650,000; carpeting, per week, 75,000 yards, 1,504,293 pounds cotton used per week; 3,954,146 pounds of starch per week; weekly pay roll, \$113,038.

The variety of goods made is almost endless. Water power is immense which drives the various mills. Some of the goods made here are found everywhere. Such as Hoyt's Cologne, Hood's Sarsaparilla, Ayers' Pills and other Proprietary Medicines. A visit to the last is very interesting. Here may be seen several vast bales of Sarsaparilla root in original packages from Honduras, Central America, Ginger from the West Indies, Burdock from Maine and other roots and herbs in abundance. Here, too, the process of manufacture can be seen. There is used in the process more than 1,000 barrels of rum per year. It is made from molasses. But to me the printing presses were the most interesting. One of them, a Scott perfecting press, made at Plainfield, New Jersey, seemed to possess almost human intelligence. It takes a roll of paper which would measure two and a half miles if laid out, and from its cylinders, with electrotype, prints at a single impression four complete almanacs, at the rate of 180 per minute, and folds them in 32 pages each, and at the same time prints the red line at the bottom. The foreman told me it is the only press of the kind in the country that is made to do so perfect work. There were printed for 1890, 151 millions of different languages, and they are sent all over the world and given to anybody who wants them. 1,800 tons of paper are used annually. The profits probably amount to \$1,000,000 per annum, and are divided chiefly among five persons — the widow and three children of Dr. J. C. Ayer and his brother who manages the business. From this one — though by far the largest — you can see what an amount of medicine goes out from Lowell for poor weak humanity.

The proceedings of the G. A. R. in Boston you will find more fully reported in the papers I have sent you than from any report I could give. It was grand indeed. Boston seemed to do its best in decoration, as well as in care for the multitude, and the thrifty Yankee turned in many an honest penny from the multitude of visitors.

Lowell is the home of Gen. Butler who is prominent in the G. A. R. proceedings, and is hale and hearty though 72 years of age. He is very much respected in Lowell, and when I asked why, was told because he always has taken the side of the poor and weak in every contest between capital and labor.

Stony Ridge, Wood Co., O., Aug. 26, '90. Mrs. Sarah Wicks who resides in this vicinity was 76 years old last Friday, Aug. 22. She was born in Union Co., Penn., Aug. 22, 1814; her maiden name was Hartsel.
