PERRYYSBURG TWP. TREASURY ROBBED.
 The Safe Opened and \$1,500 Taken Therefrom—No Clue to the Robbers.
 That the safe of the Perrysburg Township Treasurer, Geo. Whitman, had been robbed has been known by us for some time, but the general public has not been made acquainted with the fact as efforts were being made to secure the perpetrators of the crime.
 On the night of May 9th, Treasurer Whitman left his place at the usual hour, leaving \$1,200 in the safe—two \$500 packages and \$200 in loose bills and silver. On his return in the morning he found the front door of the building had been opened, evidently by a skeleton key, and the safe containing the money had been robbed. The safe had probably been opened by an expert as there is no evidence of its having been forced.
 Although every effort has been made to get some clue to the robbers, as yet no one has been arrested.

HO! FOR WASHINGTON.
 The G. A. R. Men Getting Ready to go to the National Encampment at the Capital.
 A called meeting of the commanders of the G. A. R. posts of Wood county, was held at this place on the 19th, for the purpose of organizing for attending the National Encampment at Washington, in September. Dr. E. W. Schooley, of Weston, was chairman of the meeting; and Chris Finkbeiner Secretary.
 The C. H. & D. and Chesapeake & Ohio roads offered to carry the Wood county contingent via Cincinnati to Washington, returning via Old Point Comfort, Richmond and many other places of interest, for a round trip rate of \$12.35—less if any other route offered less rates. The proposition was unanimously accepted. The tickets will be good three days going; 24 days returning, with 30 days additional if desired. The train will leave Toledo at 11 a. m. Saturday, September 17, arriving at Washington at 2:10 next day. The roads also give free transportation for a committee of three to go in advance and arrange quarters. The committee for this purpose selected are: T. J. Campbell, Bloomdale, L. W. Clayton, Bowling Green, and E. W. Schooley, Weston; Alternates, Martin Riegel, Hoytsville; G. H. Dewey, Weston, and C. W. Russell, Bowling Green.
 For the purpose of organizing into a regiment for the trip, the following nominations of officers were made to be voted upon in the different posts: For Colonel, F. M. Young, J. B. Newton, J. W. Canary, Abel Comstock and A. B. Probert, the person receiving the highest vote to be Colonel, the next highest to be Lieutenant Colonel. For Major, J. L. Dull, Jno McLain, A. T. Hickerson, C. C. Gundy, C. W. Russell and G. C. Nearing; man receiving the second highest vote to be Adjutant. For Quartermaster, J. H. Biddle and G. H. Dewey were nominated. For Surgeon, E. W. Schooley, J. B. Newton, L. Black and J. W. Canary, were appointed a committee to secure a band to accompany the regiment, provided they get one without other compensation attached than board and railroad fare, and that the railroad will stand the latter.
