





Upon arriving at Weston we looked out of the window and to our surprise saw editor Saxby standing on the platform and as soon as the dagoes alighted from the train they rushed to him and fell upon his neck and wept tears of gladness. Just think of a dark colored bunch of cheese and garlic hanging on Saxby's neck like that. Whew! Old dago Sax!

The political contest is now on in dead earnest and one week from Tuesday next its end will come. Let every citizen be at the post of duty on that day and cast his vote in conformity with his conscientious convictions. That is the glory and the high privilege of every American citizen.

In the Hon. James M. In view of this the opportunity is afforded the citizens of Perrysburg and of Maumee without regard to party to cast their unted vote for once in favor of the Hon. James M. Ashley whom they know possesses both the will and the ability to present the merits of their claims before Congress, and whose great business capacity and extensive acquaintance with the leading citizens of this State and of the Nation will enable him to serve us successfully.
