As the election is only a little more than five weeks off, the political parties will soon commence to make things buzz.

The Toledo Bee displayed considerable enterprise in running a special train to the Columbus opening of the Democratic State campaign. The Bee has the reputation of being one of most enterprising papers in this State.

Bowling Green's Rev. Herbert Agate was engaged in a little Dr. Parkhurst practice during Fair week. SUICIDE.

W. B. LADD OF WESTON, ENDS HIS LIFE BY HANGING

The Deed Done While at a Sanitarium.

The people of this county were greatly surprised to learn of the death, by suicide, of W. B. Ladd of Weston, on Thursday night last.

Mr. Ladd had been in poor health for some time, which is supposed to have caused mental aberration. On Thursday he accompanied his wife and Dr. Schooley to the little town of Texas, or Riverside Park, in Henry county, where the doctor has a sanitarium, for the purpose of having him take a course of medical treatment.

His wife remained with him and shortly after midnight, after they had retired, he arose and left their apartment, saying he would return shortly.

He did not return as soon as Mrs. Ladd expected him, and she gave the alarm, aroused the inmates of the sanitarium and instituted a search.

At 2 a. m. the barn was visited, and here the searchers were startled to find Mr. Ladd hanging by the neck from a joist, and cold in death.

The body was immediately taken down and the proper authorities notified.

The deceased was about 56 years of age, and an old resident of Weston. He was an active business man until within the past few years, and at the time of his death was the senior member of the firm of W. B. Ladd & Co., of Tontogany, but the business has always been conducted by S. L. Irwin.

For several years he was senior member of the firm of W. B. Ladd & Co., of Bowling Green his two step-sons, George and William, being the other members.

By his death he leaves a wife and two step-sons, the children of Mrs. Ladd by a former husband, who was a brother of W. B. Ladd.
