FITZSIMMONS

IS NOW THE CHAMPION.

Wins the Fight in the fourteenth
Round

Carson was the scene of a fearful contest in the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight on St. Patrick's day. The men were in fine condition and fought with the fury of demons. Time was called at 12:07. Fitz refused to shake hands. The battle was considered to be in favor of Corbett up to the last round. At one time Fitz was knocked to his knees, and Corbett could have finished him, but, evidently thinking he had the fight all his own way, wasted to finish him later. But the delay lost the Championship for Corbett. The last round reported by Associated press dispatches was as follows:

FOURTEENTH ROUND.

Corbett leads blocked. Jim lands that left jab again on Fitz head. Fitz countered with a terrible right swing on Corbett's neck and has Corbett going fast for a few moments. Fitz lands a terrible left hand jab on Corbett's stomach and Corbett goes to his knees with a frightful look of agony on his face. The timekeepers call the seconds, one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, ten—but Corbett comes to his feet, he rushes to Fitz and endeavors to strike him. There is a terrible uproar. George Siler decides that Fitz wins. The blow that did the business landed above Corbett's heart and he collapsed. The last round lasted 1 minute and forty-five seconds.

MILL BURNED.

H. M. Hoover's Saw Mill and
Hoop Factory Destroyed.

Saturday night at 11:30 flames were discovered coming out of H. M. Hoover's factory, and in about 40 minutes the mill was in ashes, together with a large quantity of lumber.

The origin of the fire is unknown, as the mill had not been in operation for about two months. It is supposed, however, that it was the work of tramps who may have entered the mill to sleep at night, and through carelessness set fire to the sawdust.

The mill is a total loss on which there is a small amount of insurance. Mr. Hoover had intended to commence Spring business in a few days. His many friends and the people generally sympathize with him in his loss. It is understood he will rebuild.

MORE REFORM.

Nationalists and Others Organize
for Political Reform.

On Friday last a number of Nationalists, a few Prohibitionists and others, met in Bowling Green and organized what they pleased to term a Union Reform party.

They organized by electing Frank Haskins, president; J. B. Smith, secretary, and Geo. Loomis treasurer.

The following platform was unanimously adopted:

"We, the Reform voters of Wood county, in convention assembled, recognizing God as the Author of all just power in government, present the following declaration of principles:

"First—We demand honest and economical administration in municipal, township and county affairs, and a reduction of 50 per cent in salaries of county officers.

"Second—All intelligent citizens should have the right of suffrage, without regard to sex.

"Third—The absolute suppression of the liquor traffic for beverage purposes.

"Fourth—The free and unlimited coinage of silver and gold at the ratio of 16 to 1.

"Fifth—All means of transportation and communication among our people which naturally tend to monopolies should be owned and operated by the government.

"Sixth—On all other questions we believe the initiative and referendum should be adopted."

HENRY E. PECK

A Prominent Citizen of Perrysburg
Passes Away.

Henry Elisha Peck, son of Dr. Erasmus Darwin and Mary Lincoln Peck, was born in Perrysburg, Ohio, April 30, 1838, and died in Perrysburg March 12, 1897. In 1873 he was united in marriage to Mary Carter Robinson of Akron, who with two sons Charles L. and Augustus Hamilton, survive him.

Mr. Peck spent most of his life in his native town, except about two years in New York City, in Florida one year, and four years as Deputy Collector of Customs in Toledo. His education was received at the Public school and from private tutors at home. Early in life he engaged in mercantile business in Perrysburg and continued an efficient and active life for many years.

He was well informed on the political history of the country and took a deep interest in all questions pertaining to its development and welfare.

He was a courteous gentleman, kind husband and father, and a good citizen, and will be greatly missed in his home and in the community and by a large circle of friends and acquaintances.

He was a great sufferer from the disease—Diabetes—which caused his death, and in all his sufferings one of the most patient of men, thinking of others rather than of himself. He was of a most generous and cheerful disposition and will be missed by many of the poor and needy.

His funeral took place from the family residence, attended by a large concourse of citizens from Toledo and the surrounding country. A. P. J.
