MAUMEE BATTLEFIELDS.

Congressman Southard Again Introduces the Bill for Purchasing Same.

Representative Southard has re-introduced bills providing for the purchase and enclosure of the battlefield sites in the Maumee Valley. Also the bill making an appropriation for a light and fog signal at the Toledo straight channel.

Mr. Southard was at the White House to-day and also called on Senator Hanna at his office to discuss matters relating to the distribution of offices to Ohio men.

Mr. Southard has also introduced a resolution directing the secretary of war to make a survey of the straight channel in the Maumee river and buy with a view to obtaining and preserving a uniform width in that channel of 400 feet and a depth of 20 feet at low water.—Blade.
