CRUSHED.

John Walters Meets a Horrible Death at Deshler.

Life Crushed Out Between Box Car and Platform.

John C. Walters, whose home was in Perrysburg, a switchman in the employ of the C. H. & D. R. R., met a horrible death while switching cars at Deshler on Saturday last.

While making a coupling he was caught between a box car and a platform, which stands near the track and is used for unloading freight, and his body crushed in a horrible manner before the train could be stopped. After the train came to a stand still he was so tightly lodged that it became necessary to saw away part of the platform in order to extricate him.

He was taken to the Ross House in an unconscious condition where physicians were hastily summoned and did everything in their power to alleviate his sufferings. He regained consciousness in a short time and realized that the end was near. Although everything within his power of the physicians was done for him he passed away at 3:20 p. m. after suffering untold agony from 10:45, at which time the accident occurred.

His remains were brought to his Perrysburg home on Sunday morning, and the funeral conducted at the M. E. church on Tuesday at 1 p. m. by Rev. Bailey and Rev. Adams.

Deceased was a member of K. O. T. M. No. 244, of Millbury, who conducted the burial services at the cemetery. He was also a member of the Y. M. C. A., of Lima, which was represented at the funeral. The Maccabees Tents of Millbury, Bowling Green and this place were present in a body to pay their last tributes of respect to their deceased brother, as also were members of the confederated Order of Railroad men, to which he belonged.

At the time of his death, the deceased was aged 22 years, two months, and two days, and had been in the employ of the C. H. & D. R. R. but four months. He was a very popular young man among his host of acquaintances as was testified to by the many and beautiful floral offerings contributed by the fraternal societies, railroad men and others.
