### From Various Towns Taken from Our Exchanges.

The Niagara Oil company of Bloomdale, has been incorporated for \$100,000.

Messrs. Coward and Saxby have been publishers of the Herald for nearly twelve years. Since Mr. Saxby has been in the postoffice at that place most of the business cares of the Herald have devolved upon Mr. Coward. His son who is now 21 years of age has learned the printing business and will have charge of the mechanical department of the paper.

### Writes of His Experiences in the Navy.

U. S. S. Pensacola,  
San Francisco, Cal.

Editor "JOURNAL":  
I am still in the same old place, on board the "Pensacola," and am enjoying myself the same as ever.

The weather is the same as it was the last time you heard from me.

We have a crack base ball team here and they have played some of the strongest teams in this district. A few weeks ago they played the 10th Inf. and were defeated by a score of 14 to 12. Yesterday they defeated the 1st Battery team by a score of 3 to 1. Besides the base ball games we have boat races nearly every day, sail-furling races, and many other things that help to enliven the interest of the daily routine.

The U. S. S. Mohican steamed into the bay from Monterey last Sunday and fired a salute in honor of Rear Admiral Whiting's flag, which flies on the "Pensacola." She has just been out with a draft of Landsmen, who were put through a course of training.

The Admiral inspected her on Monday and Thursday she left for Mare Island Navy yard, where she will undergo repairs.

The new cruiser "Tacoma" was put in commission last Friday and we are expecting that some of us will go on her. She will, no doubt, make a trip to Chinese waters, so we are all anxious to make her. She is in the same class as the "Olympia," Concord, Cleveland and the Baltimore.

The two other Perryburg lads, Redman and Curtis, are still with me, and are both well and happy.

We had quarterly examinations a short time ago in which I received a percentage of 25 out of a probable 5, which is pretty fair considering that 5 is as high as an able-bodied seaman can get. We were examined in seamanship, wig-wag signals, general signals, ordnance and gunnery and marksmanship.

But the main thing we are thinking of now is when we are going to get to sea. It is probable the "Tacoma" will take some out so we are waiting patiently for the time to come when our names are called off to go to her.
