

HISTORICAL MEETING

Between Kings on "Field of the Cloth of Gold."

One of the most interesting pages of history written by the brilliant Maucaulay, was that describing a meeting between Francis I of France, and of Henry VIII of England, during which each yielded with the other in the splendor of their retinue for a period of thirty days.

This sumptuous event between royalty is depicted with a fidelity to life in the Palais du Costume building at the World's Fair. Correctly entitled the "Field of the Cloth of Gold," and so known to most every school child in the country, it is a marvelous narrative in tableaux of the actual scene which was created by M. Felix of Paris, and which was one of the wonders of the Paris Exposition. While this is but one of the many in the Palais du Costume exhibition brought over from Earls Court London, England, yet its original cost alone was twenty thousand dollars, the entire collection selling for a million dollars.

The Zeltner Case Again.

Once again Mrs. John Zeltner made an endeavor to have her husband released from the penitentiary. Lately, attended only by a small child, she presented herself before the circuit court at Toledo, and pleaded with that tribunal to quash the indictment that still hangs over her husband for the killing of Clarence Wittmeyer, which indictment prevents the consideration of pardon or parole by the state board. Zeltner is in the penitentiary for the killing of Attorney Westenhaver at Hoytville. The little woman was told that the court knew of no law that would justify interference, but that she might appear again at Bowling Green when court was in session there. Unless Zeltner can be paroled he has still twelve years to serve, allowing for good behavior, and the wife is trying to maintain the farm, mortgaged through lawsuits and the husband's trial.
