LEGAL NOTICE. Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution of the council of the incorporated Village of Perryburg, Wood County, Ohio, adopted on the 9th day of March 1905, there will be submitted to the qualified electors of said Village at a special election to be held on said Village on the 22nd day of April, 1905, the question of issuing bonds of said Village in an amount in excess of one percent of the total value of all the property in the incorporated Village of Perryburg, Wood County, Ohio, to be used for the purpose of constructing, erecting and maintaining water works and a water works plant in and for the incorporated Village of Perryburg, Wood County, Ohio. Said election to be held at the Fire Engine House on second street in said Village. Those who vote in favor of the proposition of issuing the bonds as aforesaid shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the issue of bonds," and those who vote against the same shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "Against the issue of bonds." NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS. FRONT STREET IMPROVEMENT SALE. Notice is hereby given that sealed proposals will be received at the office of the Clerk of the Incorporated Village of Perryburg, Wood County, Ohio, until 12 o'clock noon, Standard time, of Monday, the 17th day of April, 1905, and then and there open, for furnishing the necessary labor and material for grading, draining, curbing and macadamizing of Front street in said Village of Perryburg, Ohio, from the east line of Hickory street to the west line of West Boundary street in the manner following, to-wit: (a) That part from the east line of Hickory street to the center of Mulberry street by grading, draining and curbing, and macadamizing the northerly six (6) feet from the center line of said Front street, and the southerly twenty-two (22) feet from the center line of said Front street with lime-stone macadam; and (b) That part from the center of Mulberry street to the west line of West Boundary street by grading, draining and curbing and macadamizing the southerly twenty-two (22) feet from the center line of said Front street with lime-stone macadam; excepting however, therefrom, a strip of macadam sixteen (16) feet wide heretofore authorized to be constructed, and sold by the Board of Commissioners of Wood County, Ohio, and being Section Number Two (2) of the E. L. Kingsbury stone road improvement, together with the necessary street and alley intersections, cross-walks, catch-basin and so forth. Said improvement is 6274 feet or 1.188 miles in length. Said street to be improved in accordance with the plans, specifications, plat and profile for said improvement, which are on file and may be seen in said Clerk's office. Said improvement will be sold as an entirety. Proposals must state separately in figures and words the price bid for said labor and materials respectively, of said grading, draining, curbing and macadamizing, respectively on blanks to be furnished by the Clerk of said village. Each proposal must state the location of the quarry from which the stone for the macadam is to be taken. Each proposal must be accompanied by a certified check in the sum of \$500.00, drawn "without condition as to payment" on the Citizens' Bankers' Company of Perryburg, Ohio, payable to the Treasurer of said Village, which check shall be retained from the successful bidder until he has entered into contract with said village for said work and material, and executed a bond in the sum of \$10,000.00, acceptable to the Council of said Village, within five (5) days after the award for the faithful performance of said contract; and should such contractor neglect or refuse to enter into said contract or execute said bond, acceptable to said Council as aforesaid, within said five days, then and in that case said check shall be forfeited to said village of Perryburg and shall become the property of said village in compensation for the loss and expense attending the advertising for said proposals, not by way of penalty, but as damages for the re-issuance of said proposal. Checks of unsuccessful bidders shall be returned at once. No proposal will be considered wherein the contractor has attempted materially to violate any similar contract, nor unless exhibiting the full name and address of each and every person, corporation or firm interested therein, and the name and address of each proposed bondsman, one of which must be a resident of Wood County, Ohio. Said proposals and checks shall be enclosed in a sealed envelope on which shall be endorsed, "Proposals for construction of Front Street Improvement in Perryburg, Ohio." The council reserves the right to reject any or all proposals, or to award the contract at a subsequent adjourned meeting, such adjournment not to exceed three days from said 17th day of April, 1905.
