Black Hair Strongest.

RIVER HOME POULTRY YARDS

Arthur G. Griffin, Manager of the River Home Poultry yards, feels that he has started the 1906 season in a satisfactory manner, having won four firsts, two seconds and one fourth prize at the recent Toledo Poultry show, from but nine entries.

The new Brooder house will soon be inhabited, as there is one hatch of four hundred eggs coming off to day, eight hundred that will hatch this month and the machines will be refilled as soon as vacated. It will take several good hatches to fill the Brooder house, which has a capacity of about fifteen hundred young chickens.

It would be a sight to those who have not seen a modern poultry plant to see hundreds of little chickens warm and contented in a house constructed and heated to make them comfortable even in zero weather.
