ELECTRIC RAILWAY SIGNALING.

S. C. Harvey, manager of the Bell Telephone Co., is the patentee of a railway signaling device which seems destined to greatly increase the speed of electric railway cars. It is so arranged that the motorman controls the block lights from his cars instead of it being necessary for the conductor to get off and turn the switch. And in case of any possible failure of the lights to work at any time, the motorman has the evidence right before him. It would enable a car to gain about eighteen minutes running at the usual rate of speed between B. G. and Toledo. Many automatic devices have been invented but they have not proven satisfactory. Mr. Harvey is still improving his invention.

MILEAGE TICKETS

Now Being Sold by the T., B. G. & S. T. Co.

The interchangeable mileage ticket is now on sale in B. G. at the T., B. G. & S. T. ticket office on all of the important electric lines in northwestern Ohio and northern Indiana says the Tribune. Round trip or one way tickets can now be purchased here to almost any point in the northern part of the two states.

The sale of the interchangeable tickets is but the beginning of the organization of the electric lines of the country into great systems along the same plans that the steam roads have adopted. The Toledo, Bowling Green & Southern Traction Co. was in on the ground floor and is endeavoring to give its patrons all the benefits possible. The interchangeable mileage ticket will be sold on all lines in the state within a short time and tickets will be sold from the local ticket office to any part of the state over any electric road.

The company has been also looking after the welfare of its rural patrons and has purchased some new rolling stock for the handling of its freight business in the rural districts as well as its through traffic. Four new box cars of the regulation steam road size have been purchased and will be placed on the road as soon as needed. The new cars are numbers 50, 75, 100 and 125. The addition of the new cars gives the company four good box cars, three flat cars and three motor cars which are now being used for the through freight trade.

For the benefit of the farmers two 600 foot switches have been laid, one at Leydorf and one at the Bend and others will be placed where there is a demand for same. Two hundred more feet of track is to be laid the first thing in the spring at the local freight house for the use of freight cars and the handling of the freight.

The freight business has developed into one of the best departments of the company's service since its introduction and Superintendent Smith considers it now one of the most important parts of the company's business.

FELL OFF THE CAR

Sam Krauss Sustains Severe Injuries About the Head.

Samuel Krauss is laid up on account of injuries received by falling off a Maumee Valley car.

Mr. Krauss has been a student conductor for the past week and on Tuesday about 12:30 as the car was passing Cook switch he fell from the vestibule and was badly injured.

He had not been feeling well in the forenoon and it is supposed he must have been suddenly taken with dizziness and fell out of the car as it turned into the switch. The regular conductor, Fisher, discovered he was not in the vestibule and stopped the car. Mr. Krauss was found lying on the ground with his feet in the ditch and his head near the rail. He was taken to Drs. Rheinfrank hospital for medical attention.

His injuries were found to nothing more serious than severe bruises about the body and a deep gash in the forehead and a bad scalp wound. He regained consciousness after being taken to the hospital but says he does not remember how the accident happened. It was a very narrow escape.

HAND BADLY LACERATED.

Fred Watkins, conductor on the east and west line, met with a most painful accident this forenoon. As his car was going east at the C. H. & D. crossing a horse attached to a rig became frightened and Mr. Watkins jumped off the car to lead it past.

The animal plunged and jerked the snap which fastened the hitching strap to the bridle completely through his left hand, the steel tongue of the snap opening and closing about the flesh, fastening the ugly iron in his hand.

He came up town on the car and after the snap had been cut with a large pair of pliers, Dr. Harrison dressed the wound. If nothing more serious results, Mr. Watkins will at least have a very sore hand for many days. The horse was safely piloted past the car.—Tribune.

MISCELLANEOUS NEWS

Interesting News from Various Localities in Wood County.

John Bowman, superintendent of the Middleton township schools and brother of Recorder S. W. Bowman of B. G. was taken to the St. Vincent Hospital in Toledo Thursday evening and operated upon for appendicitis. Mr. Bowman was taken ill with a chill Thursday afternoon and Mrs. S. W. Bowman ordered him to bed and called a physician. Mr. Bowman was told that he was threatened with appendicitis but he scoffed at the idea. About 7 o'clock his condition became so serious that it was necessary to call a physician again and when he arrived he said there was nothing to do but to perform an operation as soon as possible. The operation was performed but Mr. Bowman failed to rally and died on Saturday morning.

He was one of the best known instructors in Wood county and many friends will regret to learn of his death. The funeral occurred on Monday.

M. B. Chidester, one of the most prominent citizens of B. G. and a wealthy oil man died on Friday afternoon last after hovering between life and death for many days. He had been sick with heart trouble for several weeks.

He was an enterprising citizen, kind and generous in his dealings with his fellow man. He was the first oil operator to commence pumping salt water wells and thereby made a fortune.

Lute Williams, a resident of Grand Rapids township, was killed in Toledo shortly after six o'clock Thursday night last. Williams was motorman on an electric car and was crossing the tracks of the Terminal belt railroad on Summit street when an engine struck his car and crushed him beneath it.

Pemberville people are becoming interested in a concern for the manufacture of lime at that place. John VanGlabn, an experienced lime man has made a proposition to the people of that place that if they will subscribe for \$2,500 worth of stock he will organize a company with a capital stock of \$12,000. The company would erect three kilns with the necessary buildings and sheds. The stone at Pemberville, it is said, would make an excellent quality of lime.

A most remarkable case has been reported from Lima. It is that of Jacob Schick, a C. H. & D. brakeman who was found standing in the door of his barn near Beaverdam, dead of heart disease. He did not appear to be supported by anything and his position was so natural that the one who discovered him, thought from a distance that he was aliye and well, but was surprised into making an investigation on account of the man's stationary attitude.

A. A. Magell has been appointed Marshal of the village of Cygnet at a salary of \$70 per year. The Council also appointed Prof. H. E. Hill village clerk, but he declined.

The funeral of Timothy Lawler was held at B. G. on Monday. He was an old soldier and one of the pioneer residents of that city.

A. E. Smith died at his home in Weston on Sunday evening. He was a prominent citizen and was 56 years of age.

COURT HOUSE NEWS

January Term of Court Closes on Friday this week.

Edward H. Welling was awarded the decision in his suit against the Ohio Oil Co. and a verdict of \$2466.66 was given him. The case will be carried up.

The fight was between the attorneys and some interesting debates were heard, both sides putting up a strong scrap for the decision. James O. Troup was attorney for the Oil Co. and Attorney Hunt of Fremont and N. R. Harrington of B. G. were looking after the interests of the plaintiff. Welling claimed that he was preparing to pull a well on the Sanford Baker farm near Woodville in 1903 and that he was hoisting the upper part of a pulling machine when the whole thing toppled over and killed one of his horses and injured him to the amount of \$5,450.

Bernard & Karns have started foreclosure proceedings against E. S. Keslar to recover \$639.88 alleged to be due on the drilling of a well and cleaning it out on the McMurray lots in Bairdstown.

The Commissioners were very busy last Friday and Saturday with stone road petitions for Milton and Weston townships.

"Slick" Overly was arrested last Spring for illegal fishing in the Maumee river. He fought the case through Common Pleas and Circuit Courts. He finally landed in the Wood county jail 25 days ago and has been languishing there paying off his fine and costs at \$1 per day.

Through his attorneys he has just secured \$300 from the Lucas county commissioners for having fallen off an embankment at the Grand Rapids bridge, add with what was left when the lawyers got their fees out "Slick" has paid off his debts to the courts, as he has decided that he would rather pay up than "rot" as he once stated.

COURT DECISIONS.

Sarah Loe vs. John A. Loe, plaintiff given divorce and possession of children and alimony.

The Troy Buggy Works Co. vs. E. W. Pember et al., settled and costs paid. This was a suit on a promissory note.

Gottfried Nietz et al. vs. Samuel Starkweather, title quieted.
Mertie Palmerton vs. Perry Palmerton, divorce granted and one dollar a week to be paid plaintiff for support of children.

Joseph LaPlant vs. Mary LaPlant, divorce granted plaintiff and custody of children given to him.

Marie Rearick vs. Merle Rearick, divorce granted her, with alimony and restoration to her maiden name.

Chas. N. Russell vs. B. E. Onsel, balance of account due plaintiff decreed to be \$89.00. Notice of appeal given, bond placed at \$100. Motion for new trial was overruled.

Ada M. Hunt vs. Chas. Hunt, divorce for plaintiff. Custody of three children given plaintiff, defendant given one, \$5 per month to be paid plaintiff.

Wm. C. Fees vs. H. C. Sass and others on account, settled at costs of The Sun Hardware Co.

In the case of E. L. Rice vs. Lewis Ward for money, the court has overruled a motion for a new trial and given judgment on the verdict, which was for the defendant. Rice sued Ward to collect a sum of money on a bill of jewelry.

An effort is being made to form an organization of all the poultry raisers in Wood county. There are about two hundred who make a special business of this and it is believed by those who are pushing the affair that a county organization would be of great benefit to all concerned. It is thought that a poultry show can be arranged for to take place between the first and fifteenth of next January. Pemberville has a number of fanciers who are interested.
