MONEY PAID BACK

Surveyor Spafford Returns to Treasury \$626 Fees Overdrawn

The grand jury has been in session since Monday morning, and as usual are expected to produce results.

Since the examination of county by Messrs. E. N. Halbedel and W. S. Roebuck, of the state bureau of inspection, there has been much speculation on the part of the people and great desire to know what the inspectors have been finding, many people seeming to think that the mere presence of these inspectors indicated there was crookedness somewhere.

These inspectors were here under authority of a law passed about three years ago, and every county in the state must and will be inspected as soon as possible, and once every year after the first inspection.

The examination was completed three weeks ago and the report, filed with the Auditor of State, will make about three hundred typewritten pages. It will not be made public until July 1st, when a copy will be given each to Auditor Harding and Prosecutor Ladd for their information.

While errors have been discovered in every county that has been examined they are usually the result of misinterpretation of the laws and in many cases officers have been found entitled to credits as well as overcharges, and while the report of the inspectors has not been made public, it is generally understood that the county will make a good showing.

In regard to reports now being circulated the Bowling Green Sentinel says:

According to the allegations made Surveyor Spafford received \$586 for 146½ day's work that was never done. He is claimed to have turned in this time as having been gotten in by W. H. Wood. The latter denies that he worked for the county on the days designated by the Surveyor, stating that 11 days of this time were spent by him in the South.

On Monday, Mr. Spafford went to the auditor's office and presented to him a check for \$626 together with a letter saying that it was a refund for time stated by the examiners to have been erroneously charged for W. H. Wood.

Deputy Auditor Spencer to whom was presented the check and letter, asked to what the money should be credited. Mr. Spafford stated that he could not tell without looking up his records. Mr. Spencer, accordingly, told him he could not give the county's receipt for the check until he was informed where the money was to go (a part of the overdraw being probably overdrawn from different improvement funds and consequently to be credited back to these funds.) He did give Mr. Spafford a personal receipt for the check and now has it and the letter in his possession, pending the statement as to where the money shall be put. He cannot turn it over to the treasurer until he possesses this information.

The check is No. 789, drawn on the First National Bank in favor of G. W. Fearnside, treasurer, and is dated June 18, 1906.

The accompanying letter is on Mr. Spafford's official letter head and is dated "Bowling Green, Ohio, June 18th, 1906," reading as follows: "To the Treasurer of Wood County, Ohio:

The check hereto attached is for 146½ days stated by the examining inspectors to be erroneously charged for W. H. Wood. \$586

ATTEMPTED SUICIDE

Young Man Became Despondent Over Ill Health.

Harmon Grover, a young man 26 years of age took a teaspoonful of carbolic acid with suicidal intent Saturday morning at the barn of Iryin Grover, a half mile east of Sugar Ridge, but the prompt work of neighbors and a physician saved the man.

Grover was found in the barn by the son of his employer and taken to the house, where he told the family that he had taken the carbolic acid, but refused to give any reason.

Charles Wittmer, a neighbor, immediately gave the young man a large dose of cream to counteract the poison, and Miss Brown, a trained nurse who arrived a few minutes after, worked with him till the arrival of a doctor.

The young man had been to the village in the morning and visited with his mother, Mrs. Crane, and while there purchased a two ounce bottle of carbolic acid. On arriving at the farm where he worked he went to the barn and drank the stuff.

Grover is a fine young man and no reason for the act is known unless because of despondency over poor health. He has not been well for some time and only last winter it was thought that he had quick consumption.

COURT HOUSE NEWS

Legal Transactions as Conducted at the Temple of Justice.

Dela J. Clark has filed suit for a divorce on the grounds of wilful absence. George I. Clark is the defendant and the plaintiff says that she has been a good and faithful wife and that they were only married four years ago but George has been wilfully absent for three years.

The court has overruled the motion for a new trial in the case of Elmer E. Rugh vs. Albert J. Steele for damages and given judgment on the verdict which was in favor of the plaintiff. Steele says he will carry the case up.

The suit is the result of an automobile accident last fall in which Rugh was thrown from his buggy into the ditch and severely bruised and his horse and rig damaged.

The jury returned a verdict for the Commissioners in the case of Otto Reeck against the Board of County Commissioners, which occupied the Court's attention for two days.

Reeck with several others was traveling along the Walbridge road one night last December driving a one-horse rig. At the intersection of one of the cross roads and the Walbridge road was a deep cut through the road. He drove into it and sustained injuries for which he claimed \$15,000 damages. The Commissioners denied any liability and the jury only required 35 minutes to decide in their favor.
