TIRED OF PEN LIFE

Paul Zeltner Seeks to Obtain a Pardon.

The terrible tragedy that shocked the people of Wood county about eight years ago, when the Zeltner brothers came into prominence by shooting two citizens of Hoytsville, is again brought to mind by the application of Paul Zeltner for pardon.

This is the latest of many efforts made by the Zeltner brothers to obtain a release from the punishment accorded them for the killing of Attorney E. H. Westenhayer. They have expended much effort and money in the past to obtain new trials, or anything which offered them hope of liberty says the Sentinel.

Paul was convicted of murder in the first degree with the recommendation of mercy, a jury finding which practically carried with it the sentence to the penitentiary for life which Paul later received; and under the provisions of the statutes in such cases, no pardon can be granted to a man thus convicted unless new evidence is adduced which tends to show innocence. As the affair was pretty well threshed out at the time of their trial, it is unlikely that any such evidence has been brought to light.

There is another spectre which stands in the way of liberty for either of the boys at the present time. That is the indictment which still stands against them for the killing of Clarence Wittenmyer. It will be remembered that, after the sensational killing of Attorney Westenhayer (who the Zeltners fancied had grievously wronged them by charging them an excessive attorney fee and then suing them for its collection), the Zeltners were besieged in their home in Jackson township by a large crowd of men whom they kept dodging behind trees and stumps to escape the bullets which the two brothers fired at them. Clarence Wittenmyer fell a victim to one of these bullets and it is for his killing that an indictment still stands against the Zeltners. Here is the application as published in the Pemberville Leader:

APPLICATION FOR PARDON.
Notice is hereby given that at the next meeting of Ohio State Board of Pardons an application will be made for the pardon of Paul Zeltner, convicted at the April term (1899) of the court of common pleas of Wood county, of the crime of murder, first degree, mercy recommended, and sentenced to imprisonment in the Ohio Penitentiary for the period of natural life.

DEATH OF FREDERICK LEYDORF

Frederick Leydorf died January 27, 1907, at the age of 84 years, 3 months and 26 days. He was born Oct. 1, 1822, in Ersrode, Kuhlrsheim, Germany.

In 1848 he was united in marriage with Eva Catherine Stippel and to them were born five children, three sons—John C., Adam E. and Henry C.; and two daughters—Mrs. Jacob Mutchler and Mrs. Jacob Artz; also 34 grand-children and 10 great-grand-children.

In 1860 he came from Germany and located in Wood county where he resided until his death.
Deceased was well known throughout this locality and had many friends who will regret his death and honor his memory.
The funeral services were held at Zoar Lutheran church by Rev. C. S. Ide on Tuesday morning and the remains interred in Ft. Meigs cemetery.

INCREASED PENSIONS

As the pensioners get older they will go into the higher paid grades without further process.
